

SUNDAY CHAT.

BY A CHATTERER.

The death of local events of moment during the past week is a matter of great distress to the chatterer, who, strange to say, cannot, like most chatterboxes, weave a pleasing tale of chat and fiction out of 'airy nothings.'

Even the old reliable gossips, who are rarely ever to be caught without an assorted lot of sensations on hand, warranted to keep and improve with age like Limburger cheese, have temporarily succumbed to acute influences and inactively waiting for something to turn up, they listlessly loll with folded hands and dejected countenances, rolling no sweeter mangel under their tongues than a well-masticated chunk of tatty tulu. A reaction seems to have set in after the high pressure of excitement that thrilled the whole city a short time ago, and a review of the week's happenings is most unsatisfactory—'flat, stale and unprofitable.'

The opening of the pavilion seems to have resuscitated the social life of the city to such a degree that the young people are having almost as much gaiety as they had during the winter. Riding, driving, boating, excursions to the pavilion and other summer amusements are keeping society about as busy as it cares to be during the heated term.

Speaking of social amusements, would it not be a good idea to have a german club? The advantages of the german over the old-fashioned hop are plain to all who have participated in the german. Every city of any importance in Texas, except Fort Worth, can boast of one or more german clubs. Fort Worth is the only city laying claim to social eminence that steadfastly clings to the obsolete hop. The hop is well enough now and then, but it could certainly be advantageously varied by at least an occasional german.

Some of these-day folks round about town present a most peculiar appearance to the eye of a stranger—a Dallasite for instance—who may happen to take a stroll through the more fashionable residence portion of the city. It is astonishing to see what an amount of tender care and earnest attention is bestowed upon the nurture and cultivation of fine and flourishing crops of weeds along the sidewalks. They grow tall and stately on either side of a narrow little path that more closely resembles a hog path leading through an old field down to the branch than it does the fashionable promenade of a metropolitan city. Now, weeds are nice things in their places—but there is such a thing as overdoing the cultivation of weeds, running them into the ground, as it were. Carefully nurtured and cultivated weeds may in time become developed into rare and new species of exquisite flowers, but, meanwhile, the sidewalks present a most bucolic appearance, especially to the watchful eye of the envious Dallasite, who scornfully rejects the theory advanced by the Chatterer, that the citizens of Fort Worth are zealously developing new species of floral life and suggests with an intense sneer that should be gall and wormwood to any right-minded Fort Worthite that the kitchen garden and not the sidewalks is the proper place for notational experiments.

The most notable event of the week, from a social point of view, was the final and complete organization of the Commercial club. This is a step in the right direction, and it has a far deeper significance than mere casual observers might think. Heretofore the young men of the city have had no place whatever where they could go to spend their evenings in innocent diversion and recreation. Average human nature must have diversion of some sort, and if innocent pastimes cannot be obtained then the superstitious spirits of the young will naturally, and almost irresistibly be directed into vicious channels. The restraining and refining influences of home life are, for the most part, entirely withdrawn from the young men of these Western cities who live in boarding-houses, hotels and around most anywhere in a Bohemian sort of a way, having only a superficial social intercourse with each other and the families with which they come in contact. Therefore a club established for the purpose of bringing the young men of the city more closely together, strengthening the bond of union and fostering the amenities of social relations, fills a long-felt want and an "aching void" in the existence of those who have sorely felt the need of a thing of that kind.

The new pavilion has proved to be the very thing that the people, and particularly the respectable people of Fort Worth, have been wanting. At first the more refined people of the city seemed to be a little shy of the place, because, knowing that it was a public resort, they feared they would come in contact with the rougher classes, but they soon found out that the pavilion was intended only for decent and respectable people, and that the disagreeable and obnoxious element of the city were rigidly excluded. It is a pleasant sight to see the tired and business-worn people of the city enjoying the cool breezes, fresh air and enlivening music, with their children playing merrily around them, light-hearted and gay. A close observer will perceive the careworn expression on the countenances of many gradually fade out and a look of happiness and content takes its place on their faces. Rational and innocent amusement should always receive the prompt and hearty indorsement of all thinking people. Efferescence spirits expended in this way are diverted from more degrading and less healthful channels. If the more respectable classes of society have a resort where they can meet each other in an informal, social way, secure from the intrusion of objectionable characters, have pleasant chats while listening to the soothing strains of good music and enjoying the cool and gentle summer zephyrs,

they are happier, better contented, more benefited and nine times out of ten far more innocently employed than if they had to find amusement and diversion in an aimless manner around the town. The pavilion is another exponent of the advancement and progress of the Fort Worth people in the direction of that refinement which seeks innocent amusements.
