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FOREIGN AFFAIRS. Affairs in Bulgaria Gradually Drawing to a Close. THE CONSULS TURNED LOOSE. TIRNOVA, Nov. 2.—Maj. Giese and Capt. Berndorf, who were engaged in the revolution which resulted in the dethronement of Prince Alexander, were permitted to leave the prison yesterday evening, after giving bail.

THREATENED VARNA. SOFIA, Nov. 2.—Gen. Kaulbars informed M. Karaveloff by letter and the other regents by telegraph that if landing of Russians at Varna was opposed the town would be bombarded. Karaveloff asked how many Russians would be landed. Kaulbars replied, "As many as the czar pleases."

ENGLISH MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS. LONDON, Nov. 2.—Municipal elections were held throughout England and Wales Sunday. The returns up to midnight show a Conservative gain of 70, a Liberal gain of 65 and a Union Labor gain of 2.

VIENNA, Nov. 2.—The Russian government has reassured Austria that Russia will not occupy Bulgaria. KAULBARS THREATENS TO LEAVE. ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 2.—The Official Messenger says: Gen. Kaulbars has refused to notice the request of the Bulgarian government for the names of Bulgarians who have been molested in Bulgaria because the Bulgarians must know them.

REMOVED THE PLACARDS. VARNA, Nov. 2.—Russian consular officials, with the help of sailors from the Russian men-of-war, today tore down a number of placards which had been posted in the city by order of the Bulgarian government. The Russian consul threatened to land troops if the authorities attempted to prevent the removal of the placards.

CHARGED WITH HORSE STEALING. DECATUR, Tex., Nov. 2.—Constable Gilbert, assisted by D. F. Williams and B. C. Hawkins, today arrested a man named Green Brittan near the Denton county line, who is charged with horse stealing. He escaped from the Austin jail twelve months ago. Brittan was considerably surprised.

Martin Irons, who has been considered as the leader of the great Southwest strike, has been in St. Louis for some time, and for the last week, he has been practically in the employ of a man who has been almost as prominent locally, Caspar A. Heep, the secretary of the Knights of Labor. It may be remembered that Caspar was one of the hardest workers in getting fresh ball for Martin, whose lines have been none of the pleasantest. Just now he is busy with the labor ticket and other matters, and Irons is, to a certain extent, filling his place as superintendent of his feed-store, 1936 Carr street.
