British Guiana is making large shipments of gold to England, and the prospects are that the shipments will rival in value the great exports of sugar, molasses and rum.

Russia has one doctor to 6226 people. In France and Great Britain there is one physician to every 1400 inhabitants; Switzerland, one to 1500; Austria, Germany and Norway, one to 800.

Railway churches are to be attached to the trains in South Russia. Owing to the long distances traveled, and the constant work, the officials claim that they have no chance of attending divine service, so carriages fitted up as churches will run on Sundays and fete days.

A professional caterer claims that he knows how to make twenty-two kinds of entrees from shell fish, nineteen from poultry and game, eighteen from fish, fifteen from beef, and sixteen from vegetables.

During the last few years some attempts have been made to cultivate cotton in Mexico, especially near Monterey. The experiments appear to have been fairly successful, and a stock company has now been organized in Monterey for the purpose of going into the cultivation of cotton on a large scale.

The light from an electric lamp-tower in Davenport, Iowa, falls full upon a flower garden about 100 feet away, and during the last summer the owner has observed that lilies which have usually bloomed only in the day have opened in the night, and that morning glories have unclosed their blossoms as soon as the electric light fell on them.

Imitation amber is being largely used in Germany for the mouthpieces of pipes, owing to the dearth and scarcity of the real article. From time immemorial amber has been chiefly found on the Konigsberg coast of Prussia, partly by dragging and partly by mining.
