Fifty Celebrated With Appropriate Exercises at the Schools

HIGH SCHOOL CELEBRATION OF THE DAY

Committees from the Daughters of the Republic of Texas Visit Every School and Witness the Exercises.

Texas Independence Day, March 2, coming on Sunday this day, the day was not only celebrated in the schools of this city yesterday by readings, recitations, addresses and music, both vocal and instrumental. Excellent and appropriate programs having been prepared in every school in the city, the afternoon term of school was devoted to the carrying out and rendition of these programs. The parents and friends of the pupils had been invited and at all of the exercises there were a goodly number of visitors and many the crowds in attendance were very large. The little ones were in their story, as with sashes and decorations they enjoyed the celebration of the day whether they participated in the exercises or not, while the older ones, feeling a greater responsibility and recognizing that in a few years they will be shoulders on which will rest the duty of arranging for and carrying on the work which their teachers and instructors now had in hand, were deeply interested and watched the proceedings carefully and conducted themselves well, each one doing his or her part as assigned them in the exercises in a manner which showed excellent and thoughtful training and care.

The exercises at the high school building commemorative of Independence Day in Texas were highly interesting and edifying. The papers read and the addresses delivered, all of which had been prepared by the pupils to whom the subject was assigned, showed a vivid knowledge of the history of Texas and a familiarity with the many strong historical events with which the story of Texas under the three flags is filled. Each pupil had studied well the task before him or her and mastered the subject given them for recitation. They had also studied well the poems, the exercises, the manner and the delivery necessary to add strength and interest to readable and well-learned productions. These exercises were given under the auspices and management of the Adolphus society of the high school and the management of them was highly creditable to the society, and to the committee which had arranged the program and seen to its preparation. The pupils took an active part in the program and in the recitations of the poems, and in the conducting of the exercises. Harry Sawyer, the president of the Adolphus society, presided over the exercises, and presided with a grace, dignity and precision worthy of a veteran. The exercises were beautifully and artistically decorated in the National colors, red, white and blue, with Texas flags, and with a large number of Governor Searles' photographs on the wall. The high school orchestra, under the brilliant leadership of Miss J. H. Taylor, furnished some very fine music. The two selections on the program—the 'Fortune Teller,' at the opening and 'The Texas Song,' at the closing, were especially grand and magnificently rendered. The last selection was a master production and would have done credit to the well-organized and professional orchestra, and was greeted with a long, continued and loud applause. The high school choir, composed of students in the high school, is taking rapid strides to the front in musical ranks, and its performance of the 'Texas Song,' complimented where it given. The original poem read by Miss Olive Branch was a masterpiece in its execution, simple and direct in its timing and reading. Miss Branch has the voice and reads well, and her well-written poem she read to the audience. The recitation by Miss Virginia Jones and the piano solo by Miss Julia Allmond were both magnificent productions, well rendered and well worthy of the highest commendation.

TRADE RESULTS SATISFACTORY

PRESSURE FOR STRUCTURAL MATERIAL IS SEVERE.

Cereals Opened the Week With a Decided Reaction—Cotton Was Fairly Steady and Wool Freely Taken.

New York, February 28.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade tomorrow will say: Although the shortest month of the year was further curtailed by two half-days and handicapped by the most severe storms of the winter, industrial and trade results were most satisfactory. The closing week brought a general resumption of activity in lines that suffered from the weather and preparations for an exceptionally heavy shipping business was reported at many points. Southern cities alone being backward.

Footwear buyers are leaving New England without doing much more than a fair business outside of New York. Makers of cotton goods are very cautious about undertaking future deliveries owing to the uncertainty as to the labor and raw material. Export orders are still available, but prices are slightly below the views of holders. As a rule, speculative liquidation carried the decline low and there followed a recovery.

Cotton retail fairly steady at recent advance which attracted more liberal marketings than the South but in general first bids are reported very low. Wool has been taken less freely by mills, but dealers show no lack of confidence in the future of that staple.

A GOSPEL WAGON.
It is to Be Used by a Baptist Missionary for Preaching Purposes.
Yosquem, Texas, February 28.—Under the direction of Rev. D. E. Ainsworth, pastor of the Baptist church here, a wagon has just been completed that is unique in design and purpose. It is so arranged that during the winter months it can be stored away during the day and has places for arranging Bibles and tracts which are to be distributed. It is a low, wide, small vehicle. The wagon will be used within the bounds of the Colorado Baptist association, under the charge of Rev. J. H. Williamson, who will go especially to those sections that very seldom have religious services. The literature to be distributed through the wagon will be published by the American Baptist Publication society.

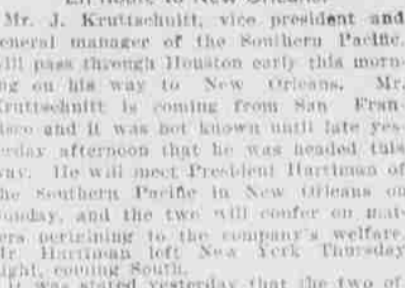
