

REMARKABLE OPERATION.

Man Sees with Rabbit's Eyes After Having Been Blind.

IT WAS A VERY DIFFICULT OPERATION

By Grafting a Rabbit's Eye to That of a Human Being He is Made to See.

The operation performed, or experiment, consisted in the removal of a dimly sighted eye which had accumulated over the right eyeball, taking the place of the cornea of the eye, which had been destroyed, and the grafting of the cornea of a Belgian hare on the eyeball, with the hope of restoring vision. A number of Clinton physicians and newspaper men were present to witness the delicate operation. The second day after the operation the patient complained of the glare of gas light through the bandage, showing at least partial success.

Dr. Seymour views this operation as the successful one of many experiments along this line and believes the following article sent him from the Iowa paper fully describes the same thing, having been done before.

THE GRAFTED MAN.

The grafting of a rabbit's eye into the cavity of a man out of Iowa is a suggestion of great possibilities in the future. There has been some idea lately that as a result of the discovery of the electric action of the eye, which compose the human body there might be evolved a system of producing human life indefinitely. It is a very strange subject; the ordinary eye and eye is not composed of any elements, but it is made of cells which can be developed to that extent. The grafting of an eye from an animal upon man, however, is a more mechanical operation which we can all understand, though we may not be able to follow the delicate calculations in comparing the parts of the eye which renders it possible.

"SINS AGAINST HEALTH"

Was the Subject of Miss Barr's Address.

SHE MAKES SOME GOOD SUGGESTIONS

And Gives Statistics as Well as Offers Solutions to the Young Women at the New York Gymnasium.

"Common Sins Against Health" was the subject of the address given at convocation yesterday morning by Miss Barr, director of the women's gymnasium of the State university. After repeating the saying of Henry Ward Beecher that the greater number of suicides resulted from disordered lives or disordered nerves, Miss Barr suggested means for improving the mental and moral condition of people through physical benefits.

In New York great gymnasia have been built among the worst elements of the city, forming public playgrounds. Public baths have also been established, adding to both the physical and moral cleanliness of the people.

Many physical defects, and notably poor EYE-SIGHT, are found among the primary grades in the public schools. One per cent of the children in the primary grades are myopic, and the percentage has been made many times over in the past few years, and the percentage increased with great rapidity as the children grow older, being 25 per cent in the upper grades and 50 per cent in the college grades.
