TWO SPEECHES AGAINST, ONE IN FAVOR

Mr. Bacon Offered Amendment that Death Should Be Penalty If Assault Were Made.

Washington, March 18.—For three hours today the senate had under consideration the bill providing for the protection of the president of the United States and for the punishment of United States citizens who commit assaults on him. Mr. Bacon (Ia.) opposed the bill and Mr. Hoar (Mass.) and Mr. Mason (Ill.) supported it. Mr. Bacon's argument followed the lines of his speech delivered ten days ago. Mr. Hoar's speech was largely legal and constitutional. He maintained the right of the government to protect itself against assaults upon its sovereignty through the president.

Mr. Mason made an attack upon anarchy and its methods and sharply criticized an amendment to the bill offered by Mr. Bacon. He denounced it as opening the door to special pleading on almost any subject. He read a correspondence from Charles H.
