

NATIONAL FUNERAL. Pannefote's Obsequies Attended With Pomp and Ceremony.

WASHINGTON HONORS HIS MEMORY. Meet Notable Ceremonial of Its Kind at the National Capital.

Washington, May 28.—The remains of the late Pannefote, British ambassador to this country, were today accorded a national funeral in the high eastern hall of the American people upon the person of the deceased, and as an expression of the friendly feeling which has been established toward Great Britain.

The late Pannefote was dean of the diplomatic corps in this country, and his death was a great loss to the persons of ambassadors, ministers and charges. In addition to these, the loss of the capital was a great one.

The presence of 1000 British troops was the sign of military participation in the funeral. The late Pannefote was a member of the British cabinet and a member of the British parliament.

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HILL AND KENNAN SAFE. Warned by Aspect of Pelee Hill Returns to Fort de France.

SECURED VALUABLE PHOTOGRAPHS. Found a Close Approach to Volcano Unlikely—Has Acquired Data in Devastated District.

Fort de France, island of Martinique, May 28, 5 p. m.—A tremendous explosion of very black smoke from Mont Pelee at a quarter before 5 this morning, accompanied the fears entertained for the safety of George Kennan, the American author and explorer, who with a land party, has been examining the northern part of the island.

The government of Martinique, M. L. Huere, was at once seized with the object of arranging a rescue party to proceed by land in connection with the voyage along the coast of the crater. The plan, should such steps appear necessary.

About 11 o'clock this morning, Ferdinand Clerc, a wealthy land proprietor of Martinique, arrived here and announced that Mr. Kennan and his party were safe on a plantation at the north end of the island.

Prof. Robert T. Hill, United States government geologist and head of the expedition sent to Martinique by the National Geographic Society, who left Fort de France Monday, returned here this morning. He was completely worn out by the trip.

Hill left Fort de France at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon. He was accompanied by the late Pannefote, who was with him from the British island of Trinidad and a boy named Joe, who was to act as interpreter.

The party set out on horseback and took the direct route to the volcano. The distance between the hamlets, Deux Joux and Fort St. Denis, the party entered upon the outer rim of the crater, which was a very narrow and dangerous path.

Prof. Hill, who was with the party, returned here this morning. He was completely worn out by the trip. He had secured valuable photographs and had acquired data in the devastated district.

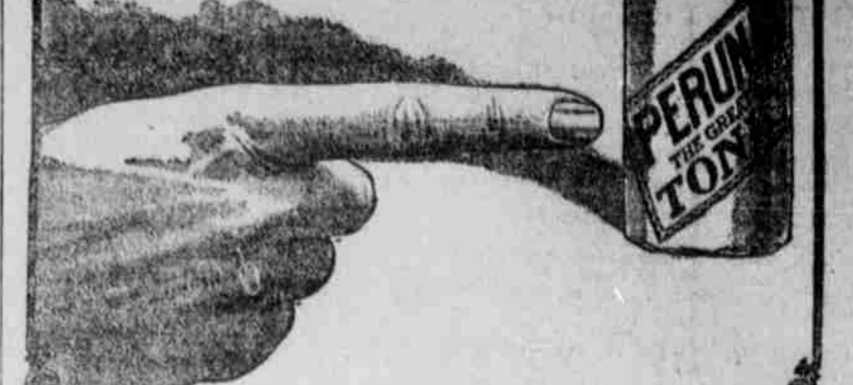
Public Schools Have Closed. Beaumont, Texas, May 28.—The Beaumont public schools closed today for the term and the children are all happy tonight.

RELATES HIS EXPERIENCES. Speaking personally of his expedition to Mont Pelee, Prof. Hill said: "My attempt to examine the crater of Mont Pelee has been futile. I succeeded, however, in getting very close to Mont Pelee. At 1 o'clock Monday night I witnessed from a point near the ruins of St. Pierre a fearful explosion from Mont Pelee and heard the accompanying rumblings. With the eruption continued no sane man would attempt to ascend to the crater of the volcano."
