There is a demand for second-hand clothing both for men and women, as well as children of both sexes and all sizes. It is the expressed hope that those who have such articles that can be used by the sufferers, among the poorer ones in the city, will phone 1246 and tell Mrs. Young what they have and where it may be found.

BOWMAN LEAVES TO RESIDE IN DALLAS

Hon. J. R. (Dick) Bowman, accompanied by his wife, left Wednesday evening for Plano on a visit with the former's relatives before locating in Dallas, where he will open law offices a little later. The departure of Mr. and Mrs. Bowman from Amarillo was learned with sadness by their hundreds of friends in this city. So thorough is the acquaintance of Mr. Bowman in Amarillo and the Panhandle, that he was frequently spoken of as a candidate for congress, as representative from the thirteenth district.

Mr. Bowman, although a young man, was known throughout the Plains country and loved by all those with whom he came in contact. He was elected first to the legislature and later, almost against his will, called to succeed himself practically without opposition as a compliment to the man, and an evidence of the esteem in which he is held.

"I have never left a place that is so near my heart," declared Mr. Bowman, just before he departed from Amarillo. Continuing he said: "The people of this city and the Panhandle as a whole are dear to my heart. They took me up and gave me preference over my fellows, not for what my father is, or what my forefathers may have accomplished, for of these they personally knew nothing. They gave me places of distinction for the confidence that had been inspired in them for me, and for this reason it seems that I am leaving that section and city where I, through my dear friends, have carved a place for myself."

"In leaving, I am unable to meet and shake hands with all of the many good friends, but I hope that they may know and appreciate how I love them for the many expressions of their esteem. This change is being made purely for the benefit of Mrs. Bowman's health, as nothing short of that would cause me to give up associations that have grown to mean so much to me. My wife is, of course, my first consideration, and our physicians have told me that she cannot live in this altitude. For that reason, and no other, is the sacrifice made."

"Should the time ever come when I can render a service for the Panhandle, for Amarillo, or any of the noble citizens of the great Plains Country, it will give me great pleasure to do so. I shall live prompted by the hope that time will offer op-

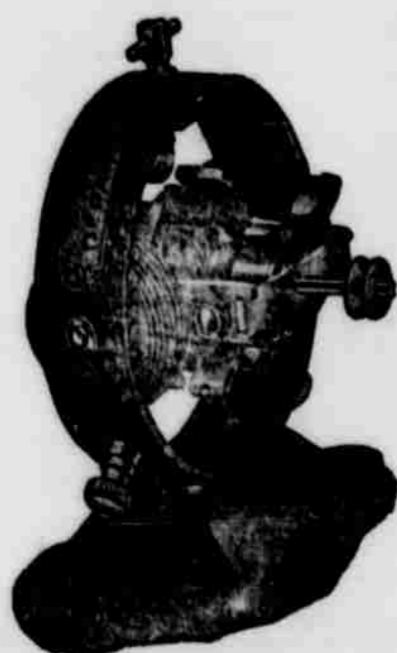

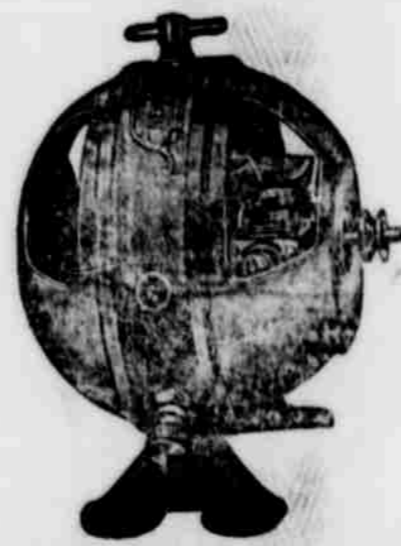

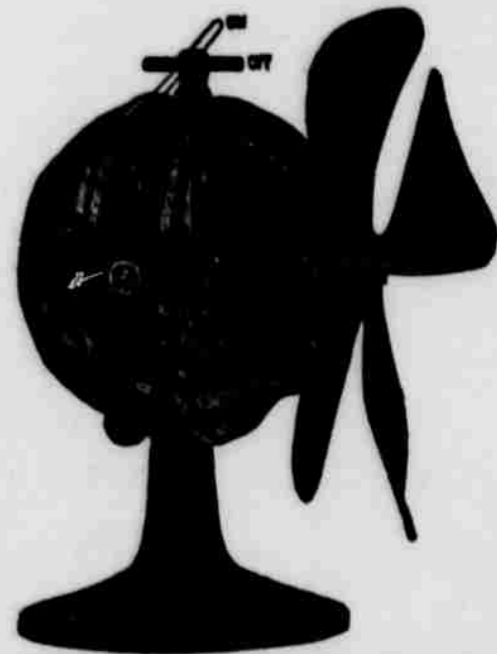
