CITY RECORDER'S OFFICE ABOLISHED

Amarillo is to be without a city recorder, and the duties and fees formerly claiming attention of that official are to be assigned to the mayor of the municipality, according to an order issued yesterday afternoon by the council. It was developed in connection with the discussion incident to making the change that under the prohibition regime there are practically no criminal fees, hence the lack of funds with which to interest a regular recorder in the holding of court.

It was also decided by the board that the award of city printing, as to the publication of ordinance and the designation of an official newspaper organ, shall be carried over until the first meeting in January. This matter has been under consideration by the board for the past several weeks, but it was thought best to carry it forward until every member of the council could be in attendance. Alderman Bivins was absent yesterday, and for that reason the placing of contract was again deferred.

Another matter that has been carried over for a considerable time, and again postponed yesterday, was the enactment of the ordinance creating the office of official inspector of meters, weights and measures. The reason for failure to act upon this proposition was also on account of the lack of a full board. In this connection it was learned that there are a number of applicants for the place that is to be created through the ordinance now under consideration, and upon which action will probably be taken at the incoming session of the council.

Special action was taken with regard to the promulgation of an order to the Amarillo Street Railway company, to adequately heat their cars. Complaint was filed with the council by patrons of the street railway, and this led to the promulgation of the order for the heating of the cars.

Salaries for the various city officials for the incoming two years, were left unchanged. In this connection Mayor Patton stated that any less salary than is now being paid would be an insult to an officer, and yet the state of the city's finances is such that no advance could be made. Taking these facts into consideration, the board held to the prevailing schedule.

Among the routine business, of which there was comparatively little was the approval of the bond of A. H. Quirk and V. A. Scott, as plumbers in the city.
