WOOD'S LEAD IS 5663 IN INDIANA; JOHNSON SHEEPS CALIFORNIA

With Senator's Progress Checked in New Jersey, Maryland and Indiana, G. O. P. Observers Figure He Is Far Short of Votes Needed to Win Nomination; Primaries Worth Little as Indicative of Nominee.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 5.—In 2139 precincts out of 2387 in Indiana, for Republican presidential preference in yesterday's primary, the vote stands: Wood, 84,332; Johnson, 52,225; Lowden, 20,014.

Wood's lead over Johnson, 5663. These as far as the vote has been counted, Wood got a little more than half of all the votes cast. Johnson a little less than half and Wood's lead is cut from first figures of last night more than 1000 votes.

Johnson supporters point out that the candidate's showing is a remarkable one in a conservative state like Indiana, in view of the fact that Wood, Lowden and Harding are regarded as equally conservative.

Unless one of the candidates obtains a majority of the votes cast, which on the face of the returns seems improbable, the contest will go to Chicago with no without instructions, unless instructed by the state convention, which will meet in the national to which were selected to-day.

There were no candidates for the Democratic presidential preference. Johnson sweeps California.

San Francisco, Calif., May 5.—Return from 54 of the 54 counties and from 1046 of a total of 1219 precincts in the state gave Johnson delegates 14,838, Hoover delegates 13,133 in the presidential primary of yesterday.

Hoover carried three of the 54 counties represented, on the basis of the incomplete returns. These included Los Angeles, where he had a plurality of 19,997.

Hoover's presidential preference, Stanford university, gave him a plurality of 24 over senator Johnson.

One hundred and seventy-four precincts in this county, Santa Clara, gave Johnson almost a two to one plurality. The vote, Johnson 61,777; Hoover, 25,312.

Three hours and a half after the polls closed last night, Ralph P. Merritt, California campaign manager for Hoover, conceded Johnson's victory.

Establishment Vote Record. H. J. Carahan, western campaign manager for Senator Johnson, in a statement, said: "The results of the primary will be more than 10,000 in excess of any plurality Johnson ever had in a primary election. It is the greatest sweep in the history of California politics in a primary election."

Ralph P. Merritt, campaign manager of the Hoover Republican club, conceded the election of the Johnson majority of delegates.

"Like good sportsmen, we concede the victory and congratulate the winner," he said.

The result represented by Hoover will continue to command the attention of the county and eventually of the Republican convention. Hoover will be nominated for the presidency.

Kentucky for Clegg. Louisville delegates at large were instructed last night by the Democratic state convention to elect James H. Clegg of Ohio, as long as his name remains before the national convention.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—Republican who hope to control the Chicago convention are stated at reports received here that W. Johnson failed to carry Indiana Tuesday. With Johnson's progress stopped in reports received here, the Republican observers figure, admitting that he carried California, that the temporary campaign in Indiana is recalled. GREATER GREECE IS BEING TO UNDELZELOS

Statesman's Hope About to Be Realized As Result of San Remo Ruling.

GAINS INCREASE NEAR THREE FOLD

And Now Final Task Is To Regain the Byzantium, After 6 Centuries.

NEW YORK, May 5.—Amid all the confusion of San Remo returns, the fact deserves attention that Venizelos at least is to have his reward and Greece to obtain substantial justice. So far reports are in accord that Greece is to obtain the whole of Thrace, Bulgaria, as well as Turkish fractions included and thus occupy the entire region between the Bulgarian frontier and the bases of the Constantinople and Gallipoli peninsulas.

Many Changes Made. In addition, three new have passed over this country since this number was taken. The population of the country has increased, while changes of rulers—portions of Thrace have been Turkish, Greek, Bulgarian and now to Greece. Greece has produced much migration voluntary and involuntary alike.

In Asia the Syria grant, despite its rather grudging limitations, will give Greece approximately 1000 square miles, or more than 400,000 people in majority. 25 Years' Struggle. A quarter of a century ago, when Venizelos came from Crete to begin his great work, Greece, just beaten by the Turks, had a population of less than 2,000,000, living on a territory of some 10,000 square miles. Athens, with the Piræus, was a tiny town, and the railway communications were totally inadequate. Greece was isolated from the rest of Europe, and order within the country was entirely lacking. By the Turkish war Greece had lost the sympathy of Europe and her dynasty had lost all domestic regard.

From the moment of his arrival and for nearly two decades thereafter Venizelos applied himself to the task of restoring Greece to the position of a modern nation. Not until 1912 was he ready to pursue his larger objective, and in these years he had regained for Greece the sympathy of the world and he had also achieved the impossible in establishing a republic.

Washington, D. C., May 5.—Opening debate on his resolution to declare war on Austria and Germany and Austria at an end, Senator Knox, Republican, Pennsylvania, declared in a Senate today that president Wilson's attitude in maintaining that the nation technically was at war to coerce the senate into ratifying the peace treaty.

He said congress had voted war with the imperial government of Germany and Austria, but that the imperial government had ceased to exist, therefore it was folly to pretend that the nation was at war with them, as there was no enemy in fact.

There was no excuse whatsoever for prolonging the war beyond the signature of the armistice, senator Knox said, "and the only explanation for so doing was the deliberate and conscious purpose of the executive to use the war as a pretext for the extension of his power."

The welfare and safety of the nation imperatively demand that we know we have peace. The whole world settles with revolution. Our own nation is in a state of anarchy and strife are rampant and threaten the destruction not only of our property, but of our free institutions and even of our lives. And yet we stand, and have stood for months, in a rudderless ship.

REBELS OF WASHING SENT TO GULF BY U. S. FOR EAST COAST UTILITY

Urbalejo's Forces Arrive From Casas Grandes in Part; Remainder May Be On Way; Juarez Quiet, With Few Visitors, No Women; First Chief Using Planes to Bombard Towns Under Control of the Rebels.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—Secretary Daniels today ordered a division of United States destroyers to sail immediately for Key West, where they will be held for possible duty in Mexican waters.

The destroyers are commanded by Capt. E. B. Loring, and include the Black Hawk, which will accompany the flotilla. Capt. Loring was in conference with secretary Daniels here last night and left immediately afterward for New York to get his ships ready to sail today.

The great fleet of today that Capt. Loring had been given full instructions as to the policy to be pursued in the event it becomes necessary to send the destroyers to the Gulf ports. The vessels should report at Key West by tomorrow night or Friday.

Rebels Threaten Cities. "Thus far no reports of any serious disturbances in Mexican ports have reached the government, but revolutionists are active not far from the ports.

It was said that reports that the rebels had been seen in the state of Coahuila had been exaggerated anywhere in Mexico as a result of the revolution.

Apparently unable to get under way any offensive military expedition against the revolutionists, the rebels in the neighborhood of the Mexican capital, according to dispatches to revolutionary agents here.

Cuernavaca, capital of Morelos, and Cuautla, in the same state, are two of the cities which have been reported to have been bombarded by the rebels.

The information through official channels yesterday indicated that the rebels, formerly an ardent supporter of Carranza, had entered the revolution in the state of Coahuila, and that the federal troops, also was contained in the advice.

Troops in Mexico. Further reports from Tarraco again is to become the objective of the revolutionists. The rebels are reported to have been trying for more than three weeks to make its way toward the state of Jalisco, northward into Nayarit, to check the Sonoran on their march to the south, had been turned about, and is on its way to the state of Coahuila, to move northward toward the state of Chihuahua.

The expectation of the revolution is that one man nor any set of men shall have the power to do their own will."
