## SOME QUESTIONS TO BE SETTLED.

Points That Will Demand the Attention of the Commission That is to Meet at Havana.

Havana, Aug. 29.—The government has appointed a Spanish commission to consider a definite basis for a treaty of peace. The personnel of the commission, however, is not announced.

It is reported that the questions to be discussed are as follows:

1. Cession of territory and the determination of conditions and indemnifications by the United States against the damage to public buildings, courts and the government lands.
2. Indemnity for war and navy material mutually agreed on to come into possession of the United States.
3. Conditions of and time for the evacuation by troops and volunteers with the war material agreed upon.
4. Commercial and custom house advantages to be conceded.
5. The recognition of property of all kinds of all Spanish citizens and guarantees to be offered them during their stay in the island.
6. The form of government to be established in Cuba.

## PERMISSION ASKED TO DOCK VESSELS.

Consul Wildman Made the Request at Hong Kong, and It is Causing Much Complication.

San Francisco, Aug. 29.—A special from Hong Kong says Consul General Wildman has asked the Hong Kong authorities for permission of the ships of the American fleet, now at Manila, to be allowed to dock for repair. The question presents such serious complications that it had to be submitted to the British home government for answer. In the meanwhile the harbor police ordered the gunboat Seafire, which arrived here with dispatches from General Merritt and Admiral Dewey, to leave British waters within 24 hours. The governor is much distressed over the situation.

### Field Day at Chickamauga.

Chickamauga, Aug. 29.—Field day exercises at Snodgrass field this afternoon, for which preparations has been in progress for some time, was witnessed practically by all at Camp Thomas and hundreds of civilians. The exercises were a series of sport and the diversion of athletic training for the men. Officials, judges and timers were all officers. Scores of soldiers participated in the contest.

### Captain Moran Leaves for Spain.

New York, Aug. 29.—Emile Diaz Moran, formerly captain of the Cristobal Colon, who was taken a prisoner after the destruction of the Spanish fleet was among the passengers on the Normandie, which sailed today for Havre.

### Will Be Taken to Plymouth.

Atlanta, Aug. 29.—The 15 Spanish prisoners of war who have been under guard at Fort McPherson since the beginning of hostilities will be taken to Plymouth, N. H.

### Miss Barton Going to Havana.

Washington, Aug. 29.—Despite Blanco's order, Clara Barton will go to Havana with her relief ship loaded by the government with 3,000,000 rations.

### Passed Wreckage and Some Bodies.

Boston, Aug. 29.—Captain Pritchard of the Comander, Carinthia, which has arrived here, reports passing on Aug. 17 a quantity of wreckage and the bodies five persons on which were life belts on the Grand Banks. One body was that of a man of unusual size. A life buoy of foreign make was near the body.

The Turkish wrestler, Yousouf, familiarly called the "Terrible Turk," was believed to have been lost in the Bourgoine disaster and the body mentioned above might have been his. Yousouf was of large physique.

### Divided the Burt Reward.

Austin, Aug. 29.—Acting Governor Jester divided the reward of \$500 offered for the capture of Eugene Burt, who was hanged on June 24 last. Two former citizens of Austin, M. G. Poindexter and M. W. Piety, were living in Chicago at the time of Burt's murder and both pointed out Burt to a policeman and he was arrested on Aug. 18 1898. Poindexter was given \$300 and Piety \$200.

### Three Texas Postmasters.

Washington, Aug. 29.—The president has appointed the following Texas postmasters, Harper Simpson at Edna, Harry Bock at Hillsboro and W. A. Stoner at Waco.

### Suit Against the Santa Fe.

Galveston, Aug. 29.—Randall Scheldemantle has filed a suit against the Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad company for \$40,000 damages for injuries received on May 24, 1898.

### Anderson Is Dead.

Garland, Tex., Aug. 29.—William Anderson of New Hope, who was thrown from his horse while going for a doctor for one of his children, died of his injuries.

### Machine Shops Destroyed.

Cleburne, Tex., Aug. 30.—The Cleburne Foundry and Machine company's building near the Santa Fe depot was destroyed by fire. Loss about \$35,000.

### Negroes Invited to Leave.

Gatesville, Tex., Aug. 29.—Some negroes report that they were waited on and invited to leave. They report it was white men.
