## REFORMS IN CHINA ARE SET BACK.

The Dowager Empress Takes the Reins of Government in Her Hands.

## THE EMPEROR IS LET OUT.

It is Said the Change Was Made to Prevent a Deal For an Alliance With Japan.

## RUSSIA WILL HAVE FULL SWAY NOW.

Li Hung Chang is Very Likely to Be Given Back His Place, and This Means All to Russia.

Pekin, Sept. 23.—An imperial edict just issued definitely announces that the emperor of China has resigned his power to the empress (Dowager Empress) who has ordered the ministers to deliver to her in future their official reports. It is difficult to obtain information at

the palace in regard to proceedings, but the recent reformatory edicts probably caused the changes. While the emperor was subservient and a mere figure-head, the dowager empress permitted him to remain in peace, but so soon as he attempted to set on his own initiative his practical disposition was the result.

His principal adviser, Kang Yumoi, the Cantonese reformer, fled in spite of the vigorous attempts made to arrest him and it is said he is now on his way to Shanghai.

The effect of the change will be great. In all probability Li Hung Chang will

be reinstated in power and Russian influence will increase. The hopes of reform so ardently cherished by the intelligent factions of the Chinese are now far from fulfillment. The suddenness of the coup is said to be due to the desire of the dowager empress to prevent the mission Marquis Ito from being successful.

### Old Confederate Dead.

Paducah, Ky., Sept. 22.—Major I. P. Girardey, a Confederate veteran, aged 70 years, died here. He was born in France and spent most of his life at Augusta, Ga. He invented the Girardey fuse to explode shells, for which invention he received \$50,000 for a one-fifth interest during the war. His invention was successfully used in the Franco-Prussian war. During the past few years he has resided in Paducah.

### What One Man Produced.

Pilot Point, Tex., Sept. 23.—E. S. Spomer on the Steiner farm, one mile east of Pilot Point, raised this year from one and one-half measured acres of land 171 gallons of nice sorghum, 30 cents; \$51.30; 1450 bundles of fodder, \$1.00; 100, \$14.50; 42 bushels of cleaned seed,

50 cents; \$21; total product of one and one-half acres \$96.80.

### Shooting at Ennis.

Ennis, Tex., Sept. 23.—George Jackson, a boy about 18 years old, who claims to live in California, became involved in a difficulty with a young man by the name of Jim Callahan, who drives a delivery wagon for Nichols' grocery store, resulting from a squabble over a pistol cartridge. Callahan is shot through the bowels and is seriously if not fatally hurt.

### GALVESTON STRIKE GROWING SERIOUS.

A Mob of Negroes Attack the Negroes at Work—One Man Was Killed and One Slightly Wounded.

Galveston, Sept. 23.—A mob of about 40 or 50 negroes made a sortie at 11 o'clock last night, forcing their way past the two sentinels at the western end of the front shed of the Mallory wharf, and effected an entrance through the rear door.

The two policemen guarding the central front of the shed ran in, but were cornered by the guns of the mob. The mob then opened fire on the Houston negroes, who had knocked off work for the night and had gone to sleep in the shed. The pursued negroes soon got to a peer behind the many boxes and barrels and the mobbers emptied their pistols without inflicting any more serious injury than a scalp wound on the head of one man.

Some 15 minutes after the shooting a Galveston negro was found in an apparently dying condition west of the shed. It is believed that he was accidentally shot by some one of his comrades. He wore a white handkerchief over his face and had a 44-caliber pistol on his person. Three of the mobbers had been freshly discharged. He died on the way to the hospital.

### TWELVE INCH GUNS BETTER THAN THIRTEEN.

Changes in the Construction of Guns Make Them More Speedy and More Effective.

Washington, Sept. 22.—The navy department has recently placed orders for forgings for naval rifles of calibers from four to 12 inches to supply the new battleships and in a short time the navy-yard's factory will begin to turn out ordnance embodying radical changes in construction and much more powerful than guns of the same caliber on our ships. The new 12-inch gun will be as effective as the present 13-inch gun in range and striking force. This is achieved at the expense of weight, but the difference is still in favor of the new design. The new gun will send its projectile at the enormous velocity of 3000 feet per second, which is about 50 per cent greater than the velocity of the present 13-inch shell.

The ordnance officers say that there is a very erroneous idea prevalent as to the value of the ammunition shot away by Dewey at Manila and by Sampson's fleet at Santiago. Instead of this running up as high as \$2,000,000 as asserted in some quarters, the fact was that Dewey at Manila fired \$47,000 worth of ammunition and the North Atlantic fleet at Santiago on July 3 and during the bombardments will not exceed \$100,000.

### Sue for Damages.

Waco, Tex., Sept. 23.—Neth P. Mills sued the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway company for \$20,000 damages for personal injuries. He alleges that last April at Granger, Tex., he was not allowed, under the gate system, to board the train without a ticket, and that there was no agent present to sell him a ticket. When he ascertained that he could not get a ticket he undertook to board the train as it moved off and, falling, he alleges he was crippled for life.

### Man Seriously Injured.

Bonham, Tex., Sept. 23.—News reached here of a serious accident on Timber creek, north of the city. A man named Marion Culp was coming to town with a load of baled hay, and as he reached the bridge the wagon shifted to one side and the man was thrown from his wagon. Several bales of hay and a spring seat fell on him. He received serious internal injuries, and is not expected to live.

### Fifty Thousand Dollar Blaze.

Longview, Tex., Sept. 23.—A \$50,000 fire occurred here in the most valuable part of the square. C. W. Lawrence, owner of a fine 2-story pressed brick, was the principal loser. His house and stock of drugs were worth \$12,500, insured for \$6000. The fire stopped at the First National bank, damaging the fire wall considerably. C. C. Bradburn, shoemaker, damaged considerably by moving out.

Johnson, a prominent young lawyer, surrendered his pistol to Justice Bayless and accompanied the justice to the courthouse. Johnson was released on a bond of \$1000. Cause of the trouble unknown.

### Nine Freight Cars Ditched.

Grand Saline, Tex., Sept. 22.—Nine freight cars were wrecked at this place. Several of the cars were badly smashed and the track considerably torn up. No one was hurt.

### Store Burned at Liberty Hill.

Liberty Hill, Tex., Sept. 23.—J. D. Russell's storehouse burned. Value of house and stock, \$4000; insured for about \$2000.
