### SPAIN SENDING TROOPS TO THE PHILIPPINES.

One Way to Look at This Move an Objection Could Be Raised, but in Another There Could.

New York, Oct. 10.—A dispatch to The Herald from Washington says:

The United States may submit a diplomatic protest to Spain through the French government against its action in sending a Spanish auxiliary cruiser loaded with arms and ammunition to the Philippines.

In any event the matter is under consideration and it is believed has been called to the attention of the American commissioners in Paris. The cruiser in question is the Buenos Ayres, belonging to the Spanish auxiliary navy, which Rear Admiral Dewey reported to the navy department several days ago, is due to arrive at Singapore, Straits settlements, on Oct. 13.

It is appreciated by the authorities that Spain has the same right in the eyes of international law to send reinforcements to the Philippine islands that this government has, and any protest made would be of the most diplomatic character and simply designed to make it plain that the continuance of the average official of the Buenos Ayres is objectionable. On the other hand, a member of the cabinet said that all of the Philippines, with the exception of Manila, are in the nominal possession of Spain and that it is her undoubted privilege, if she deems it advisable to do so, to send troops to the eastern islands to subdue any insurrection that may occur. Another member of the cabinet, who talked the matter over with the president, admitted that Spain has the moral right to despatch reinforcements to the Philippines, but as the forces of this government are in control, it is within its authority to prevent such reinforcements reaching their destination. However, it is not expected that the matter will go beyond a protest, if it does that far.

From the dispatches received from Chairman Day the authorities are still of the opinion that the work of the peace commission will be completed before congress meets. Mr. Day takes quite an optimistic view of the situation. It is his desire to limit the time of discussion of the various points raised as much as possible, in order that the negotiations may reach an early conclusion. Information which has been received here shows conclusively that Spain has no further hope of foreign interference, and this fact leads the authorities to believe that she will not attempt to drag the negotiations out as long as she would if she believed there was a chance of any European government attempting to secure a modification of the American terms.

### WILL NOT HELP MINE OPERATORS.

Governor Tanner Will Not Protect the Mines if They Employ Imported Labor to Run Them.

Springfield, Ill., Oct. 10.—Governor Tanner has had a sharp controversy over the telephone with Manager Lukens of the Chicago Virden Coal company in regard to sending troops to Virden where the operators have been planning to use imported negroes to fill the places of strikers. Manager Lukens in reply to a question said he proposed to import labor and would operate his mine if necessary at the mine of Winchester. Governor Tanner said he would not send troops to assist the operators in running their mines with imported labor, and if the operators attempted to enforce their ideas in regard to Winchester he would send the national guard to Virden to disarm all.

In regard to the situation at Pana Governor Tanner said if the operators persisted in employing imported labor he would withdraw the troops from that place.

### INSANE GRIPMAN ON A CAR AT CHICAGO.

He Runs His Car to the End of the Line, and When Reason Returned, Asked to Be Cared For.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—John B. Jessen, a gripman on the South State street cable line, became suddenly insane and while in this condition, ran his train loaded with passengers from Twenty-second to Madison without accident. When the train was ready to make its return trip, Jessen's reason returned and realizing his condition and fearing a return of the mania, perhaps with disastrous results, called to a policeman and asked to be cared for.

When taken to the police station Jessen was raving again, but became quiet after a time. He has no recollection of bringing his car from Twenty-second street up through the crowded business thoroughfares, and his responses to the conductor's signals were entirely mechanical. Several days ago Jessen was struck on the head by an accidental releasing of a lever at the car barn and severely injured. This is supposed to be the cause of his insanity.

### Held Two Sessions.

Paris, Oct. 10.—The United States peace commission held two sessions today. They were devoted to acquiring and weighing information relative to questions involved in matters under immediate consideration by the commissioners.

### MRS. GEORGE'S PLEA WILL BE AN ALIBI.

She Expects Also to Prove That a Man in Woman's Clothes Killed Mr. Saxton.

Canton, O., Oct. 10.—Mrs. Annie George was arraigned here on an affidavit charging her with murder in the first degree for killing Mr. Saxton. This was nothing more than a formality for fixing the date for a preliminary hearing. It is claimed that the defense will be an alibi and that the shots were fired by a man in woman's garb.

A postal card dated Springfield, O., Oct. 8, addressed to the chief of police of Canton signed X. Y. Z. saying: "I called Saxton and I am not sorry for it, catch me if you can," has been received by Mayor Rice.

The coroner resumed the examination of witnesses and the number on his list indicates that his examination will not be concluded for several days.

### Getting Worse and Worse.

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 10.—The yellow fever situation in Mississippi grows rapidly worse, and unless cool weather comes soon nearly the entire state bids fair to become infested.

Harrison has a population of only 150 people, yet 19 cases developed here Sunday.

Hattiesburg now has 14 cases. In Jackson little yellow fever flags marking the presence of infection and is increasing rapidly. There is now only one section of the city without a case of the disease, north Jackson, and there are two or three suspicious cases under surveillance.

### Fall of an Astronaut.

San Francisco, Oct. 10.—Charles W. Voemer, an astronaut, fell from a balloon at the Golden Gate park, and received serious injuries. Several ribs, beside an arm and leg being broken. He made the ascent lashing by his teeth to a strap attached to a trapeze. His body failed to clear the roofs and wires surrounding the grounds and he was thrown from a height of about 50 feet into the street.

### The End of Evacuation.

Madrid, Oct. 10.—It is said here that the evacuation of Porto Rico will be completed by next week, and that the evacuation of Cuba will be accomplished by the end of November. The government is employing 31 vessels for the repatriation of troops. The soldiers have received pay for June, and on landing in Spain they will receive two months pay, will be given civilian clothing and be mustered out of service.

### Remanded For Another Week.

London, Oct. 10.—Dr. Nancy Guilford, the mistress of Bridgeport, Conn., who is under arrest here charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Emma Gill, was again remanded for a week at the Bow Street police court. Counsel for the prisoner said the client did not dispute the identity with Mrs. Guilford, who was wanted by the Connecticut police.

### Steamer Aground and Afire.

Philadelphia, Oct. 10.—The British steamer Weehawken, oil laden, from Philadelphia for Virden, is aground and on fire at Cherry Island flats, Delaware river, about 20 miles below the city. The Weehawken cleared this port Saturday. The cargo consists of 1,000,000 gallons of oil, valued at \$40,000. Reports are that the Weehawken will be a total loss.

### Wife Murderer's Skull Fractured.

Telluride, Colo., Oct. 10.—Dr. O. F. Mentzer shot and killed his wife without provocation. He then pointed his revolver at W. F. Monroe of Cleveland, a brother of Mrs. Mentzer, who is visiting her. Monroe grappled with the murderer, and in the fight that ensued the doctor's skull was fractured. It is believed he will die of his injuries. Monroe was not arrested.

### Officials Leave for Omaha.

Washington, Oct. 10.—The Washington official party which is to attend the Omaha exposition started in two separate trains over the Pennsylvania and Baltimore and Ohio railroads. Their itinerary is so arranged that the two parties arrive at Omaha close to each other.

### Appointed Two Indians.

Washington, Oct. 10.—The president has appointed L. C. Burris and Napoleon Bainsworth of the Indian territory, both Indians, coal and asphalt trustees for the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations.

### Will Retire on Saturday.

San Francisco, Oct. 10.—Rear Admiral Miller will retire from the navy next Saturday.

### NEWS IN BRIEF.

John Ford, a farmer, fell from a wagon loaded with wood at Guthrie, O. T., and was crushed to death.

Martin Hall was arrested at Sulphur Springs, Tex., for the murder of Jack Ulin.

Howard Clark and Hattie Mahoney were shot to death near Owensboro, Ky. Clark was wanted for burglary and fired on the officers who attempted to arrest him. The girl was with him and also shot at the officers.

Sister Claire, mother superior of the Victoria convent, aged 70 years, died at Corpus Christi, Tex. She was the oldest nun in Texas.

The railroads of Texas will ask for an injunction against the cotton rate decided upon by the Texas railway commission.

The annual convention of the Daughters of the Confederacy, to meet at Houston, Tex., on Oct. 14, has been postponed until Nov. 20.
