LATE YELLOW FEVER REPORTS.

Disease Increasing in Louisiana as Well as in Mississippi—No Hope Until Frost Comes.

Washington, Oct. 11.—Reports to the marine hospital service show that yellow fever in the south is steadily increasing. Officials state that the increase in fever is likely to continue until cold weather sets in and this is thought to be at least three weeks off from the regions most affected.

Dispatches received here report the total number of cases in Mississippi up to date to be 470 with 36 deaths since the epidemic broke out.

Yellow fever is reported to have occurred at Lake Charles, La.

At Franklin, La., there are 25 new cases, no deaths.

Camp Hutton, the new fever detention point at Avondale, near New Orleans, with a capacity of about 3900 is now open.

KNIGHTS TEMPLARS' PARADE A SUCCESS.

Twenty-Five Thousand Templars Were in Line, and the Spectators Estimated at One Million Souls.

Pittsburg, Oct. 11.—What Jerusalem was to the Crusaders almost a 1000 years ago, that was this city today to the Knights Templars. All night and early this morning every railroad leading into the city and every street car line entering from the surrounding suburbs came in loaded, cars belching thousands and thousands of people. The railroads anticipating the rush, had made every preparation to convey all comers to the "Mecca" of the modern pilgrims, and from a radius of several hundred miles towns, hamlets and villages literally poured in their population into Pittsburg. There could not have been a more beautiful day for the parade of the Knights Templars. The hour of the parade was set at 10 o'clock, and from early dawn everybody and everything was astir at the various headquarters of the different commanderies preparing for the march. In the yards of the railroad depots and hotels all was life and bustle as soon as the first troops of the plumed knights, dressed in full regalia, with their various positions in order to appear on the street. Here hands were waiting on the m and the march to the rendezvous began.

By 8 o'clock all downtown streets were filled with different detachments of the paraders and each had its own band of music, martial airs that rent the air with melody, marches and patriotic songs as well were calculated to inspire the greatest enthusiasm. Points of vantage along the route of the parade rapidly filled up. Seats had been erected all along the line of march to accommodate 300,000. It is estimated the parade was made up of upwards of 25,000 uniformed knights moving along in carriages, on horseback or on foot, and there were at least 1,000,000 spectators lined along the route of the parade, which was four miles long. The parade was all that could be expected.

OUR TRADE WITH CHINA INCREASING.

It is Exceeded Only by Great Britain and More Than Doubles That of Germany.

Washington, Oct. 11.—Special reports from United States Consul Johnson at Amoy, and Consul Fowler at Chefoo show an enormous increase in our foreign trade with China, and points out the great value it is to the United States. Last year the volume of trade exceeded that for 1896 by 32,000,000 taels, a tael being reckoned at 73.5 cents. The value of the United States' trade in China represented 15 per cent of the total, being more than double the whole German trade, and second only to Great Britain.

Dead on His Wife's Grave.

Chicago, Oct. 11.—Policeman Alex L. Mikelsen was found dead on the grave of his wife in Mount Olivet cemetery. Mikelsen was dressed in full uniform. A bullet wound in the temple and a revolver by his side told the story of the suicide. Mikelsen's wife died five months ago, and he has visited her grave daily. When he failed to answer at roll-call a detail of brother officers went to the cemetery and found his body.

The Cleveland Seen.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 11.—The steam schooner Rival which arrived here from St. Michaels last Saturday reported the overdue steamer Cleveland at Dutch Harbor, Sept. 30. She was preparing to sail for San Francisco that night.

General Mix Dead.

Niles, Mich., Oct. 11.—General Ellisha Mix is dead at his home in Allegan, where he has lived 50 years. He was made brevet brigadier general in the civil war. He was 80 years of age.
