## NEXT CONGRESS IS REPUBLICAN.

The House and Senate Go to That Party by Tuesday's Election.

## THREE CONTESTS WILL BE FILED.

The Tenth Congressional District of Kentucky, Ninth North Carolina and Ninth Virginia.

## SEVEN STATES RETIRE DEMOCRATIC SENATORS.

They Are Delaware, West Virginia, Wisconsin, New York, New Jersey, California and Indiana—The Returns by States.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The next house and senate will be Republican. The Republicans claim 188 members of the house, giving the Democrats 164 and the silver Republicans and Populists 6 and 4 doubtful.

Delaware, West Virginia, Wisconsin, New York, New Jersey, California and Indiana will return Republican senators. The senate will stand over 50 Republicans to less than 40 Democrats.

In the next congress, for the first time in history, there will not be a Democratic senator from an old northern state. And, excepting Montana and Utah, there will be no Democratic senators from northwestern states.

Several bi-state districts in New York and Pennsylvania were transferred to the Democratic column. The Democratic gains in these two states wipe out the two-thirds' majority the Republicans have in the present congress.

The Republican candidates in the Tenth congressional district of Kentucky, Ninth district of North Carolina and Ninth district of Virginia will contest the elections.

The result by states is as follows: Alabama—Democrats elected all of the nine congressional candidates. No election for state offices.

Arkansas—The six members of congress are all Democrats. No state officers elected.

Colorado—Entire fusion ticket headed by Charles S. Thomas was elected. The legislature is largely fusion. The congressmen are silver Republican and Populists.

California—Republicans elected Gage governor over Macaire, and will control the legislature. Republicans get 6 congressmen and Democrats 2.

Connecticut—The Republicans elected the four congressional members by large majorities.

Delaware—The Republicans get control of the legislature on joint ballot and will elect a senator to succeed Senator Gray Republican congressman elected.

Florida—The Democrats had their own way in Florida. They elected both congressmen.

Georgia—The congressmen elected are all Democrats. Their majorities are overwhelming.

Idaho—Stuenkel, the Democratic candidate, is probably elected over Moss, Republican. The legislature will be controlled by the Democrats, silver Republicans and Populists. The congressman elected is a Populist.

Illinois—The Republicans elected 15 out of 22 congressmen. The legislature is close and will require the official count to decide.

Indiana—Nine Republicans and four Democrats were elected to congress. Legislature is Republican.

Iowa—The Republicans elected all the congressmen, 11 in number, by large majorities.

Kansas—Republicans elected W. E. Stanley governor over Leedy, secured 7 of the 8 congressmen and will control the legislature.

Kentucky—Seven of the congressmen are Democrats and four are Republicans.

Louisiana—Democrats secured the six congressmen without any extra effort.

Maine—Republicans elected the four congressmen.

Maryland—Of the six congressional delegates four are Republicans and two Democrats.

Massachusetts—Rogers Wolcott re-elected governor by the Republicans. Legislature is Republican and they secured 10 of the 11 congressmen.

Michigan—Governor Pingree was re-elected by about 40,000 plurality. The legislature is largely Republican and the congressmen elected all 12 of the

Missouri—Dem won state plurality in the state is between 55,000 and 40,000. Of the 15 congressmen 11 are Democrats and four R-Republicans.

Montana—The congressman elect is a Democrat, but was elected on the fusion ticket.

Nebraska—Poyner, the fusion candidate was elected governor. The six congressional delegates are three Republicans, one fusion and two Populists. Republicans seem to have the legislature.

Nevada—Francis G. Newlands was re-elected to congress on the fusion ticket.

New Hampshire—The eight congressmen are Republicans.

New Jersey—Republicans secured six of eight congressmen. Legislature is New York—Theodore Roosevelt was elected governor over August V-n Wyck, the Democratic candidate by 18,353 votes. The legislature is Republican. Of the 34 congressmen, 15 are Republicans and 19 Democrats.

North Carolina—Two Republicans and seven Democrats elected to congress. The Democrats carried all the local elections.

North Dakota—The Republican state ticket was elected. The congressman is a Republican.

Ohio—The congressional delegation was unchanged by the election. Fifteen Republicans and six Democrats.

Oregon—The Republicans secured the two congressional delegates.

Pennsylvania—Stone, Republican, was elected over Jenks, Democrat, by 124,000. Of the 30 congressmen 22 are Republicans and 8 Democrats. Legislature is Republican.

Rhode Island—Republicans secured the two congressional delegates.

South Carolina—Democrats had their own way. Elected seven congressmen and carried the local elections.

South Dakota—The election is favorable to the Republicans, but is still in doubt.

Tennessee—Democrats secured eight of the ten congressmen and elected their state ticket.

Texas—Sayers elected governor over Gibbs, Populist, by 3 to 1. Constitutional amendment relating to pay of legislative members defeated. Legislature overwhelmingly Democratic. The 13 congressmen are all Democrats except one. They are as follows:

Tenth—H. B. Hawley, Republican, reelected.

Eleventh—Rudolph Kleburg, reelected.  
Twelfth—J. L. Slayden, reelected.  
Thirteenth—John H. Stephens, reelected.

Utah—The Democrats control the legislature and elected their congressman.

Vermont—The two congressmen are Republican.

Virginia—The Democrats secured everything. They elected 10 congressmen.

Washington—The two congressmen are Republicans.

West Virginia—The legislature is Republican. Three congressmen are Republicans and one is a Democrat.

Wisconsin—Republicans elected their state ticket, carried the legislature and secured all congressmen, 10 in number, except in the Second district, which is in doubt.

Wyoming—Wyoming is Republican. They secured everything contested for. One congressman from that state.

Tammany Hall Not in It.  
New York, Nov. 11.—Richard Croker said when he heard that some one was to try and contest Colonel Roosevelt's eligibility to the gubernatorial chair:

"Tammany Hall has nothing to do with any such scheme. We fought Col. Roosevelt at the polls. The returns say that he is elected. We know nothing of any such intention ascribed to some animus of the organization. We are not behind it and will not stand for it."

Must Wait Returns.  
Chicago, Nov. 11.—A special to The Times-Herald from Sioux Falls, S. D., says that from present indications it looks as if the constitutional amendments on equal suffrage, initiative and referendum and state dispensary had carried in North Dakota. Nothing is likely to be known until all returns are in.

Pointer Elected Governor.  
Omaha, Nov. 11.—Official returns indicate the election of Pointer, the fusion candidate for governor, by 2000 over Hayward, Republican. The balance of the fusion state ticket will have about the same plurality. The state legislature will be Republican on joint ball a by from 6 to 8, insuring the election of a Republican to succeed Senator Allen in the senate.

North Dakota Returns.  
Fargo, Nov. 11.—Complete returns from all but three small counties show the entire Republican state ticket was elected with majorities between 7200 and 7500.

Close In Minnesota.

The tug owners had been offered \$50 for their services. The ship and her cargo are valued at \$250,000.
