### CHRISTMAS DAY.

The Trees, Dinners, Fireworks and Festivities

MAKE THE DAY PLEASANT.

GENERAL GOOD ORDER AND SOBRIETY PREVAIL.

The Christmas trees at the Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian churches Tuesday night were attended by large crowds. The trees were laden with presents and all very beautiful. An additional charm was added to the service at the Baptist church by a special musical program arranged for the occasion, and the congregation at this church contributed \$100 as a Christmas offering to the children in Buckner's Orphan Home at Dallas.

But the greatest of all the Yuletide joys is found in the Christmas stocking. When the great roaring fire has melted into glowing embers and the lights burn low, when fitful shadows dance and play upon the floor, when the little tots are snugly tucked within their beds, and angels softly kiss their eyelids down, 'tis then the little heads are filled with dreams of treasures rich and rare, and Santa Claus in cap and furs steals softly down the chimney and fills each stocking from his wondrous store. With the first flush of morn the "dream ship" flies away and each little one is up with a bound. The row of well filled stockings meets each sparkling eye and the odd looking, knotty and shapeless things are more beautiful to childhood than the masterpiece of a sculptor, and for once we have an example of absolute and perfect human happiness.

There were services at 11 o'clock yesterday at the Presbyterian church. Rev. G. E. Clothier of the Methodist church, preached a timely sermon which was the subject of much favorable comment on all sides. We would be pleased to give the full text of the discourse, but it is impossible at this time.

It would be impossible to mention all the many happy circles which gathered around the festal board in our city yesterday; but there were reunited families and meetings between friends long parted, and every dish was flavored with kind words and merry laughter, while jests and songs went round. The day was inspiring and lovely within itself; the rays of flashing sunlight gleamed like shafts of burnished gold, and the pure crisp air of winter buoyed the spirit and accelerated the step. Each with his joys, if great or small, seemed happy and content, as if the angels' greeting at the birth of Christ again from Heaven was sent.

The boys on the streets began shooting fireworks Christmas eve and continued the war nearly all night and all day. Good feeling was maintained throughout, few accidents and no serious ones have been reported. Yesterday a number of young men got their horses and had some lively skirmishes with roman candles and lassoes. The minstrel street parade at noon yesterday on Main street was bombarded mercilessly with cannon crackers, but the men kept in line gamely and the "band played on." The matinee performance yesterday afternoon was very well attended, but proved a disappointment to almost every one, and was really, excepting one or two features, very lull. The night performance had about the same number in attendance and is reported to have been some better.

#### Mr. Noah Dansby Dead.

The sad intelligence of the death of Mr. Dansby, which occurred at his home four miles east of Bryan at 2 o'clock last night, was received here at an early hour this morning, and hundreds of friends are deeply grieved on account of his untimely death. Mr. Dansby was 39 years, 6 months and 2 days old, and leaves a wife and one son. He was a brother to Durant Dansby of this city and had many other relatives in the county. His death resulted from complicated throat troubles. He was a good man and one who will be sadly missed in his own community and throughout the county. Truly joy and sorrow walk hand in hand through this vale of tears, and great is the sympathy felt for the bereaved family in this heavy affliction. The funeral occurs at 10 a. m. tomorrow at Steep Hollow cemetery.
