THE GREATEST SUCCESS IN

A VERY LARGE ATTENDANCE.

Perfect Weather, Splendid Mu-

The Fifth annual D. Y. K. ball and  
banquet given by the young men of  
Bryan last evening is said by those in  
attendance to have surpassed any en-  
tertainment ever before given by the  
club. In the first place the night was  
perfect with just enough of cold to  
make dancing pleasant; added to this  
the music was the best that could be  
secured and absolutely above criticism.  
It was supplied by Berry's orchestra  
of Galveston, composed of Prof. E. W.  
Berry, Daniel P. Shaw, August New-  
mann, Adolph Mueller, and W. Burk-  
head, whose services were secured  
through the kind offices of Mr. J. S.  
Fordtran, an ex-member of the club.  
The decorations showed exquisite  
taste in design and arrangement, and  
reflected much credit upon the deco-  
ration committee who are under many

was. A soft and beautiful pink effect
