SPANIARDS ATTACKED.

Insurgents Make Them Fight For Their Lives.

THEY MADE A GALLANT DEFENSE.

One Lieutenant, One Sergeant and Fourteen Government Soldiers Are Killed and Five Wounded--The Battle Was Near San Quintero--Loss to the Insurgents Is Not Stated.

HAVANA, Feb. 4.—A force of insurgents under the leadership of Nunez attacked a detachment of Spanish troops near San Quintero. The Spanish repaired to a railroad between Esperanza and Jicotca and made a gallant defense. They lost Lieutenant Eduardo Borges, one sergeant and 14 soldiers were killed and five wounded. It is not stated how many, if any, the insurgents lost.

Refugees Arrive at Tampa.

TAMPA, Fla., Feb. 4.—Two hundred refugees arrived from Havana Sunday night. They say no passports will be issued to the Spanish subjects after Gen. Weyler arrives. Maceo has broken through the Spanish cordon and is in Havana province eluding General Marin in Vuelta Abajo.

An American planter is on his way to New York to see his associates regarding the payment to the insurgents of a tax to grind cane. All plantations where grinding is permitted pay a tax of 25 cents a sack.

A skirmish is reported to have occurred near Quivican on Saturday between the Spanish and insurgents in which both sides lost heavily. Both claim the victory.

NOT DOING MUCH BUSINESS.

The Manchester Canal Not Coming Up to Expectation.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—The Manchester ship canal is not doing much business according to the figures for last year's operations transmitted to the state department by United States Consul Grinnell at Manchester. He says only "small cross-channel" boats are carrying out full cargoes and the effort of the company to attract Indian and China trade has been attended by disappointment. Although last year merchandise was sent to the United States to the value of \$14,156,414, yet not one package was shipped direct to New York since the canal opened.

CROP FAILURES IN NICARAGUA.

Drouth Causes Business on the Western Slope to Fall Short.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Owing to a 3 year drouth on the Pacific side of Nicaragua the coffee crop has been reduced one-half. This is the statement of United States Minister Baller, who also says the crops of corn, beans and sugar has been cut short and the duties on these articles are being suspended. Great impulse was given to their importation, as well as the wheat and flour from our Pacific states.

TRUST CLAUSE SET ASIDE.

The Fair Children Win Their Suit Before Judge Slack.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 4.—It has been decided by Judge Slack that the trust clause in the will of James G. Fair was invalid. The decision was rendered in the suit brought by Charles L. Fair to quiet title to the Lick House property. The action was brought to test the validity of the irrevocable trust clause and it was most strenuously opposed by W. S. Goodfellow, one of the trustees. The other executor joined with the children in the attack on the clause, although they entered a formal defense to the action. The children of Mr. Fair have thus succeeded in having it decided by the court that the will of their father in so far as it deprives them of the residue of his real property is absolutely void.

DETERMINED TO STOP GAMBLING.

Governor McIntyre Will Reorganize Denver's Fire and Police Department.

DENVER, Feb. 4.—Governor McIntyre has determined upon a complete reorganization of the Denver fire and police department with the view of putting a stop to gambling and kindred evils in the city. President Frank Church of the fire and police boards has resigned in compliance with a request from the governor. Police Magistrate DeWitt C. Webber has been appointed to the vacancy. Chief of Police Gooding has resigned and many changes will be made in the police force.

John Swim, the Miser, Dead.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 4.—Old John Swim, the miser, whose tales of buried treasure have been told the country over, died yesterday on his farm, near Alton. His guardian says that according to the best information Swim was 103 years old.

Store Burglarized.

LOCKHART, Tex., Feb. 4.—The dry-goods store of L. Schwarz & Co. was entered. About \$75 worth of goods was stolen. No clew.

Shoemaker Suiicided.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 4.—A faller, aged about 50 years, a shoemaker in this city, committed suicide at the St. Charles hotel.

TERRELL AND THE PORTE.

The United States Minister Alone the Guest at Court Dinners.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 4.—It is denied that the porte has refused to admit a second dispatchboat for the service of the United States legation. The porte, it is claimed, does not contest the right of entry, but contends that the moment for such reinforcement is inappropriate.

It has been much remarked in official circles here that since the rigorous action of the United States in behalf of American missionaries, Minister Terrell alone is mentioned in the court circulars as guest at the court dinners.

The impression prevails in diplomatic circles here that the United States and Great Britain may eventually unite in order to save Armenians.

FROM MOSUL TO MARDIN.

Trial of a Traveler in Disturbed Districts of Turkey.

BOSTON, Feb. 4.—The following letter shows what the trials of travel in Turkey are at the present time. The writer made the journey from Mosul to Mardin:

"We heard rumors," says the writer, "of the dreadful happenings in the region of Diarbekir. Had we left Mosul at the time proposed we should have entered the storm surging about Mardin. There was some uneasiness in Mosul, but the vali kept things quiet. Friday, Nov. 22, I received a telegram from Mardin to come to Jeziret with government protection. The vali, who had been unwilling, finally ordered two mounted policemen to accompany me. On Monday the road was declared unsafe near Jeziret and we waited.

"Four times we attempted to depart under escort of bodies of soldiers which were moving towards Mardin and each time at the last minute the military commander declined to do escort duty on some slight pretext. On the 4th attempt, Dec. 10, the writer left Mosul with a column of infantry. He was courteously treated on the journey, the officers offering escorts or protection if necessary, the offers being, fortunately, not necessary. On reaching Jeziret the troops were sent off to Bitlis and an escort to Diarbekir; and with aid from Mosul home was safely reached."

Brought From Montana.

COLEMAN, Tex., Feb. 4.—Sheriff Sanders has lodged in the Coleman county jail one Wiley Davis, arrested in Fort Benton, Mon., for horse theft in this county in 1883. The grand jury returned eight bills against Novill, Cotton and Davis at the fall term in 1883. Davis escaped. The other two were sent to the penitentiary for long terms, but were since pardoned.

Odd Fellows at Houston.

HOUSTON, Feb. 4.—The grand lodge, the grand encampment and the state assembly of the Daughters of the Rebekah, the three branches of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows are in session here. About 900 delegates are in attendance.

Charged With Forgery.

TALOGA, O. T., Feb. 4.—Fred Walker, who has been teaching school in this county, has been arrested on a charge of forgery alleged to have been committed in Iowa, but the case has not yet been made clear enough to secure a requisition.

Display of Poultry and Pigeons.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The seventh annual exhibition of the New York Poultry and Pigeon association opened at Madison Square garden today. Over 5000 entries high class chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese and pigeons are on view.

Shadrick Inman Seriously Ill.

ATLANTA, Feb. 4.—Shadrick Inman, father of John T. Inman, the prominent New York banker of S. M. and Hugh T. Inman, well known capitalists of Atlanta, is dying at his home in this city. He cannot survive.

Trouble Is Predicted.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 4.—Trouble seems imminent over the Republicans' purported attempt to force out two Democrats in the house. The ballot today was: Hunter, 65; Blackburn, 54; scattering, 8.

Against Poolselling.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 4.—The Grant-ana bill which prohibits poolselling in Kentucky and has been regarded as the death knell of all horse racing in the state, was passed the house by a vote of 71 to 13.

Shot Him Dead.

JEWETT, Tex., Feb. 4.—Dan Vaughn shot and killed John Harraway here. Harraway was cursing Vaughn's mother when Vaughn shot him with a doublebarrel shotgun.

Head Up and Robbed.

SOUTH McALESTER, I. T., Feb. 4.—George Oida, a peddler, was held up by 10 masked men and robbed of \$250 and his watch near this place.

Charged With Perjury.

PERRY, O. T., Feb. 4.—D. H. Keene, a prominent local business man, holding considerable property in Texas and the west, has been arrested here for perjury on a warrant sworn out by Stewart E. Decker.

THE McFEE MURDER.

Joseph L. Giles Given a Sentence For Seventeen Years.

LINCOLN, Ill., Feb. 4.—The finale in the McFee murder case was a surprise to all. The tramp had maintained his innocence until Saturday and many believed him throwing the guilt on a person from here. But a query from his sister, Mrs. Hongh, who had come from Ohio to attend his trial, brought forth a confession. This was repeated in court, after which Giles told his own story.

He claimed that a revelation from God had commanded him to found a new sect, and that after reading the book of Mormons he became convinced that this was the doctrine he sought. It was while still with this idea in his mind that he came to this vicinity. On the fatal Sabbath day he passed the home of the honest old farmer who fed him the morning before. He said that irresistible impulse overcame him then and he jumped over the fence and shot Mr. McFee.

The tracks of Giles, who became better known as the "Tennessee King," were closely followed to the city limits and his worn satchel found beside them, but no trace of the pistol could be found. In his confession Giles told how he had hid it in the cornfield as he fled, and had carefully patted down the earth to conceal the hiding place.

Still claiming that he had fulfilled a mission from God, he asked the court to give him the death penalty in preference to imprisonment.

Judge Herdman, however, could only give the sentence of the jury, which sends Joseph L. Giles to the penitentiary for 17 years.

RESULT OF A SPREE.

Four Drunken Men Inject Morphine in Their Arms.

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., Feb. 4.—Dr. Hurst and four friends went on a spree at Hennington Gap, Va., yesterday, and after becoming crazed by drink the doctor injected morphine into their arms. As a result, James Miller is dead and the other members of the party are in a precarious condition.
