TWO KILLED IN ILLINOIS HOLDUP

VICTIMS OF THE AFFAIR WERE MEMBERS OF ITALIAN SECTION GANG.

SHOWED FIGHT AND WERE KILLED

After the Killing, the Italians Fled, Leaving the Section House in Possession of the Robbers Who Looted It.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Two men were killed and another shot and seriously injured in a battle with hold-up men at Riverside, a small town on the Illinois Central railroad, 15 miles south of Chicago tonight. Late tonight, two robbers broke into the section house which was occupied by several Italian laborers and the railroad men who had retired for the night, were ordered to produce what money they had. Instead of complying, the Italians rushed on the robbers and tried to overpower them. In the fight that followed, revolvers and knives were used with the result that two of the Italians were killed and another seriously injured. Seeing that they were getting the worst of the fight, the other occupants of the section house fled and left the robbers in full possession. The two holdup men then secured all the money which the men had secreted about the place and made their escape.

Florida Feud Prisoners.

Jacksville, Fla., Sept. 19.—All the prisoners who were brought here by the militia last week from Baker county are still in jail here, but attorneys who have been engaged by some of the prisoners will institute habeas corpus proceedings.

"Lord" Barrington's Appeal.

Jefferson City, Mo., Sept. 19.—The appeal for a new trial in the case of "Lord" E. Seymour Barrington, convicted of the murder near St. Louis of James P. McCan, the well known horseman, reached the supreme court today. The appeal will be heard in January.

Melodrama Killed Her.

Logansport, Ind., Sept. 19.—Overcome by excitement while witnessing a melodrama in a local theater to night, Mrs. Brutus O. Marshall rushed toward the stage, ostensibly to restrain the heroine and after taking a few steps, fell forward dead.

Rosemount Flag at Half Mast.

Evansville, Sept. 19.—The flag at Rosemount will be half-masted as a tribute to George Bedford, who has been deceased of the West Shore road here for 27 years. Bedford died suddenly today. He was an employee of Indian Harbor, who never went to the station without paying a visit to the flag station.

Stock Broker Insolvent.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 19.—Richard A. Johnson, a stock broker of this city, and son in law of U. S. Senator Cassius M. Marsh, filed a petition in bankruptcy in the supreme court of the District of Columbia. He claims his liabilities at \$429,457 and his assets at \$317,185.

Blood Will Tell.

St. Paul, Sept. 19.—A remarkable record of demonstrating a prize winning strain was instituted today in the World's Fair cattle show, when the blood descendants of Doug Ferguson, owned by Gushy and Simpson of Indianapolis, Mo. won the first six awards in the event for Herefords.

Post School Not Beneficial.

Washington, Sept. 19.—Major John C. Bate, U.S. army, commanding the northern division, in his annual report to the war department, says that the experience of many years is that no great public advantage is derived from the post schools for enlisted men and that they should be conducted as night schools with permission for any soldier to attend who so desires.

Lena Being Dismantled.

Vallejo, Cal., Sept. 19.—The work of dismantling the Lena commenced today at the Mare Island navy yards under the direction of gunners.

Gusher at Batson.

Batson, Tex., Sept. 19.—Wing No. 2, which has been gushing for two days, came in today as an oldtime gusher. It has been gushing for fifteen hours without a stop, at a rate variously estimated at from 6,000 to 20,000 barrels a day. It gushed a six-inch stream of oil 125 feet high and formed into lines. This makes the west side of the field absolutely sure producers from now on. This well is only twenty feet from the west line of the Paradise company's thirty-acre lease.

Soldiers Pilaged Ports.

Baltimore, Sept. 19.—On the morning of September 12 two Army soldiers pilaged the ports of Baltimore and Boston. Strong guards are now manning the ports.
