Owners of Automobiles Are Asked to List Their Cars for Rides for Convalescent Soldiers at the Army General Hospital

The people of Corpus Christi having automobiles are to be given an opportunity for a most unusual piece of public service and one which will be of inestimable value to the prestige of Corpus Christi.

The U. S. General Hospital No. 15, stationed at Corpus Christi is an added to the city in every way and the position of recreation for these convalescent soldiers is one which is near the heart of every citizen.

The War Camp Community Service, in seeking means of entertaining these men and after consultation with the military authorities has decided that one of the best means of entertainment is by means of auto rides. A plan has been suggested out which will provide in the type of entertainment provided the various automobile owners of the city with reasonable and take up their own patriotic duty. Major McNeely is hereby in favor of this plan as it great benefit to the convalescent soldiers. The plan is as follows: A list of all the automobile owners will be compiled who are willing to go to the hospital once or

twice a month on a regular schedule and take out those men designated by the military authorities as most in need of this type of recreation. The owners will be notified of the day of their assignment by Edward M. Ailes, chairman of the War Camp Community Service committee having this matter in charge. The ride is to last not longer than one hour as this has been designated as the proper length of time for the military authorities. The hour at which these rides will be held is to be decided each evening. If a sufficient number of citizens are willing to take up this work the hospital will not be heavy on those who have already accepted their willingness. Two hours a month, and if enough agree to take up the work only one hour, can not deprive the owners of a great deal of their time and will be of inestimable value to the convalescent patients.

It is hoped that all those who are willing to take up this work will not let the thing printed here and will either bring or send it to the War Camp Community Service headquarters in the Commercial Association rooms.

GOOD ROADS BOOSTERS WILL MEET ROTARIANS

Discussion of Modern Highway Between San Antonio and Corpus Christi is Arranged for Rotary Luncheon

At the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club, Nueces Hotel, today at 12:15 o'clock, Will H. Furlong, secretary of the Texas County Highway League, will be present and will discuss plans for community co-operation in securing a modern highway between San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

Plans for building this road were well matured and the co-operation of the Rotarians, Wharfedale San Antonio and San Antonio Rotary societies assured, when war activities engaged the attention of the people of the four counties with the result that for the past six or seven months it has been hard to interest people along the Sag route. It is hoped to reinstate this enthusiasm under plans that will be proposed today.

It is said that the route along the Elgin Lanes is progressing in better fashion and that bonds have been voted and sold for the purpose of building the modern highway from the Becker County line to the Bluntz bridge at the Nueces line, this road being through Agua Dulce, Live Oak and San Patricio counties.
