TUESDAY, AUGUST 27 DESIGNATED AS PAY THE PRESIDENT DAY

Nurses County People Who Have Pledged Themselves to Buy War Savings Stamps Are Urged to Make Purchases As Soon As Possible

W. C. Butler, chairman of the Nurses County War Savings Committee yesterday issued an appeal to the people of this county to fulfill their pledges to purchase War Savings Stamps. Mr. Butler, in this respect having:

"August 27th has been designated as 'Pay the President Day,' which means that it is a reminder that you have pledged to buy War Savings Stamps and that you should see that your pledge is paid by that date. You can buy it any time before then but by all means see that it is taken care of before the first of September.

"To those who are able to take up their entire pledge it is important that you do so. There is a great demand at this time on account of heavy expenditures that the Government is compelled to make the necessary funds with which to prosecute the war program its ultimate success, and it is urged that all pledges be paid during the month. An appeal is also made to those who have not pledged up to this time that they do so at once. To those who can buy more than they have pledged it is your duty to support the Government with your additional purchases.

"Your pledge card is worth nothing unless you fulfill your obligation by making payment of same.

"If you should be visiting in the city and your pledge card is back home there are some banks, postoffice or any designated War Savings Agency and get your stamps. You will be given a receipt for the amount which can be applied on your pledge when you return home. Regardless of where you pledged you can buy stamps from any agency and get credit on your pledge card.

"Texas has not as yet reached the amount designated as her quota in War Savings Stamps, and it is incumbent upon you to do your duty in buying more and especially in keeping your pledge.

"Many of our farmers made their pledges based upon their products for a crop and in this section of the country has been blessed with abundant crops and splendid prices you should be able to take care of your pledges before the date mentioned on your cards and it is hoped that you will do so. Others who pledged nominal amounts stated that if their crops warranted it they would increase them, so your attention is called to this just at this time so that you will do your best. The farmers of Nurses County have shown their loyalty in a degree that is commendable, yet there is a great deal more to be done and you can do your part."

CORPUS CHRISTIANS ADOPT FATHERLESS FRENCH CHILDREN

Miss Alice Jones Who is in Charge of the War Charity for This City Reports That Up to Saturday Night Twenty-One of the Children Had Been Adopted

Miss Alice Jones, representative in Corpus Christi and vicinity for the American Association that is engaged in the labor of love of having American adopt fatherless children of France, reported Saturday that in addition to the list previously published the following have agreed to adopt one of the children.

Miss Samuel Adler, Mrs. T. H. Randall, Mrs. S. M. Gagnon, Joseph B. Cobb Jr., Chas. M. Taylor, Mrs. A. C. Felton, Miss May Dunn and Joseph Hirsch, this making a total of twenty-one adoptions for Corpus Christi.

"Those who are interested in this war charity are reminded that the child adopted remains with its own mother at her home in France and is reared in the religion of the mother. Miss Jones will be pleased to fully explain the particulars to those who are interested.

"The husband of France is being to defend his country, as the battlefront is hurried the splendid promise of young France. If the old France, freed into this conflict and spending every ounce of energy and manhood in the struggle to give birth to a new France, worthy inheritor of her splendid achievements, her children must be reared into young generation of strength and promise.

"No greater work can be done for France than to give these children, the chance of which their fathers' death has denied them. Their right is an emergency which must be met immediately, and it is the duty of every citizen of the physical, mental and moral welfare of the child cannot be repaired later.

"Over one hundred years ago France came to the assistance of the young American Republic, today the Republic of France sends America through the voice of her sons dying in the ranks of freedom. I save my life. Will you help my little ones?"

"This month a child one day in its mother's home, 13.00 keeps a child one month in its mother's home, 136.50 keeps a child one year in its mother's home.

"Every cent of the money subscribed goes to the child. Expenses are met from voluntary donations for that purpose.

"The work is carried on through local committees, each of which is provided with a list of French children. Upon receipt of your pledge and first payment, the name and address of a child will be given you. As these children are 'adopted' their names with those of their 'adoptors' are returned to our French committee. Payments are made quarterly by the mother or guardian of the child, by postal money order, naming the name and address of the American donor.

"Every war orphan of France who is certified to be in need and who is being brought up in his own home is eligible to this help.

"With every quarterly allowance is sent a letter from the Paris bureau explaining the friendship of America and instructing the child or its mother to write a letter of acknowledgment to the American benefactor.

"Through this personal touch we are building up between the two peoples a lasting and unbreakable friendship.

"You will often be asked how you may be sure that the money will reach the children. The safeguards are: First, the character of the American and French committees; second, the fact that every payment is made on government postal orders; third, the fact and be open for inspection, and third, and above all, that the children and donors are put into personal correspondence so that if the child should fail to receive its remittance, the donor would be notified by the child or its family.

MERCHANTS REPORT A BIG TRADE SATURDAY

With Farmers Getting a Record Price for Cotton and the Pickers Making Fine Wages Business Conditions Are on the Boom in Corpus Christi

Merchants Saturday reported the best business that they have enjoyed within many months. With cotton selling at 22 cents a pound and Nurses county having the best crop in its history together with the fact that there are hundreds of pickers in the fields making from 13 to 15 a day, conditions throughout the county are now better than at any time within the past three or four years.

"The one delay in handling the big cotton crop with dispatch is being trouble that the gins are having in getting started for the season. All three gins in Corpus Christi were up of commission for several hours Saturday and at a time when the yards were filled with cotton. These difficulties, however, will be surmounted within another few days according to the gins, and they will then be prepared to operate their plants day and night, on a seven day basis, until the crop has been gathered and ginned.

"Farmers report that many families are arriving in the county to help gather the crop and they are making fine wages. One farmer told The Caller that a Mexican family employed on his farm during the past week picked eight bales of cotton, for which they were paid \$128. With the price of 11 a bale that is being paid for picking cotton, and with such a heavy crop, it is not at all difficult for a hard worker to earn from \$20 to \$35 a week. Many of the pickers are working on a seven-day basis.
