Monday Night Reports to Chairman Roy Miller Bring Memberships to 6,637, Corpus Christi Furnishing 4,071 of This Number, Robstown 1,000 and Other Outside Districts 2,516.

KLEBERG COUNTY REPORTS TOTAL OF 2,300 MEMBERS

Magnificent work on the part of Corpus Christi committees Monday, together with additional reports from outside districts, last night swelled to a total of 6,637 memberships in the Red Cross as a contribution from Nueces County to the great money organization. When work was started at 9 o'clock a total of 3,367 memberships stood to the credit of Corpus Christi. When work was finished at midnight it was found that the committees had secured an additional 75 men, women and children who had been missed in the first count, while 27 additional 629 memberships were contributed by those Americans who are anxious to help those who have the heart but not the dollar. These two items brought the Corpus Christi total to 4,571, or practically the same number of memberships that the entire county furnished in the campaign one year ago.

From the outside districts that had previously reported 2,376 memberships, an additional 144 were reported, bringing a total to 2,516. This included 160 from Pearland, 60 from Galatin, 1,000 from an addit. from Clarkwood and 50 new members from Robstown. The total has now been brought to 1,000, which is a record for the Texas community of similar population, Robstown having 1,250 people.
