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RESPONSIBILITY FOR WAR BEING FIXED IN BERLIN

FIRST OF DOCUMENTS TO BE PUBLISHED IN MONTH

Statements of Director of Krupp Factory and Prince Lichnowski, Ambassador to England are Verified by Documents Thus Far Examined

By The Associated Press. Washington, Dec. 25.—Responsibility for the war has been assigned to the Kaiser, the crown prince, the chief of staff, the chief of the German foreign office, the following in order:

First, the German emperor and the crown prince; second, General Ludendorff and Admiral von Tirpitz; third, the great industrial concerns; and fourth, the Kaiser's staff.

The first part of the documents relating to the cause of the war will be made public within a month, Kautsky said, and at the same time the Austrian government will publish some of the documents found in the archives of the Hapsburgs.

Brownsville, Dec. 25.—The spirits of any resident of the Brownsville district who had anticipated a "mellow" Christmas celebration, were damped today by an order from the local immigration officer, instructing immigration inspectors to "lift" the passport of any citizen of this side of the international border who visits Matamoros, the Mexican town opposite Brownsville, and while in an "intoxicated" condition attempts to return to Brownsville.

The Mexican town is "wet," while Brownsville is "dry." The order also directs that any alien showing signs of "intoxication" who presents himself for entrance into Brownsville, shall be refused admission.

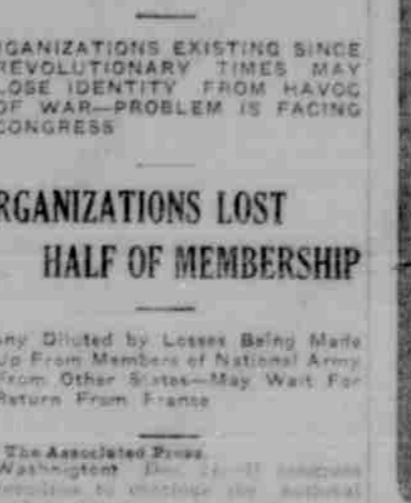
