Hot Weather in the North.

The intense heat throughout the north last Wednesday and Thursday resulted in many fatalities, principally in the larger cities. In New York there were 158 deaths and 178 prostrations. In Philadelphia there were 300 prostrations and 72 deaths. At Baltimore there were 23 deaths and 49 prostrations. Kansas City was the hottest place, the thermometer ranging from 96 to 108 degrees.
