Executive Committee.

Pursuant to the call of the chairman, the democratic executive committee of Lavaca county met at the office of Paulus & Ragsdale Saturday afternoon. The chairman was absent. Wm Blakeslee was chosen chairman pro tem and Dr. F. L. Fordtran secretary.

A resolution was offered and adopted endorsing the action of the state executive committee in calling a primary on June 6th.

A motion was made and carried that primary elections be held in each precinct for the purpose of nominating county officers.

It was duly ordered that the primaries for the nomination of county officers be called by the precinct chairman of each precinct on Saturday, the 27th of June.

It was moved and seconded that the precinct chairman of each precinct shall return the vote to the county executive committee to be counted on or before the 1st day of July. Carried.

Mr Conrad Limberger, a hardware merchant of this city, committed suicide Wednesday morning at 6:10. He had been drinking very heavily for about a week, and being in a partial crazed condition fired the bullet which ended his life. Circumstances show that he came down from his room a few minutes prior to the event, purchased a bottle of whiskey and returned to his room over the stairs. He then picked up a pistol, fired one shot into the east wall, and placing himself in front of a mirror he sent the second shot into his body about an inch and a half above the navel. The shots were heard by several parties, but they did not know from whence the sounds came, and his body lay as it fell until his clerk, Geo Fietsam, came down about 7:30 o'clock to open his store. Fietsam went to Limberger's room, and seeing the situation at once gave the alarm. Life was practically extinct, how

ever, when the body was found. Judge Hancock held an inquest, and returned a verdict in accordance with the above facts.—Weimar Mercury.

Uncle Daniel Culpepper was in town Tuesday and reported the May beetles doing great damage to garden truck. The bugs only appear at night. Some gardens have been nearly destroyed by them. They are said to come from the common grub worm.

Brandon Smith has secured the plant of the defunct Golf News, formerly published at Edna, and will move the plant to Gonzales and begin the publication there of a sound money democratic paper. Mr Smith's mission at Gonzales this week was for that purpose. A sound money organ has been much needed in Gonzales, as the inquirer is a strong free silver paper. Mr Smith will no doubt meet with good success.
