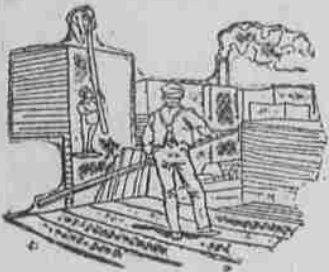

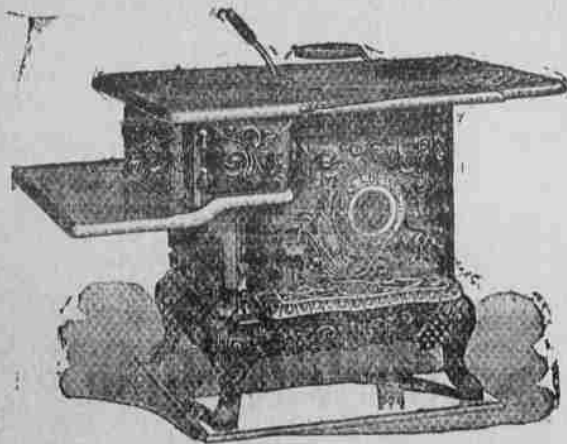

OUR COUNTY CAPITAL.

Some breezy Dots from Hallettsville.

HALLETSVILLE, Tex., Nov. 16 '96.
Editor GAZETTE:

Once more things have assumed their normal condition and are moving along smoothly.

Most of the newly elected officers have filed their bonds and taken oath of office.

D. A. Paulus, as county judge, and A. H. Willer, as commissioner for Precincts Nos. 1, 8 and 8, have

taken their seats, and commissioner's court is grinding away on business for November term of court.

The tax collector having finished the 'rounds' through the county is in his office here every day, where parties desiring to pay taxes can find him.

One night last week as one Millerberger, who resides near Breslau, was enroute home after having sold a bale of cotton, some one from the roadside shot him in the head with a pistol, then jumped into the

wagon and began beating him. Dr. E. M. Rabb was summoned to attend the wounded man's injuries. Sheriff Houchins, who is always ready to give evil doers his attention, went to work and landed in jail one Lewis Herndon, colored, who also resides near Breslau. It is said that his guilt can easily be established, and our efficient sheriff has another scalp dangling at his belt.

Attorneys J. P. Ellis, R. B. Allen and J. W. Ragsdale all had business out of the county last week.

V. Ellis went to his ranch in Zavala county, so lawyers are not as plentiful in Hallettsville as usual.

Jno. H. Meyers, Esq., has been appointed City attorney to succeed D. A. Paulus, resigned.

Prof. E. J. Mair, of Shiner, C. A. Peterson, of Hallettsville, and E. P. Guenther have been appointed as county board of examiners of teachers for Lavaca county. The next examination will be held Friday and Saturday of this week.

Ex-county Judge T. A. Hester, who is the new justice of the peace in this precinct, has been quite sick but is improving. He doubtless is the oldest Justice in Texas, being 76 years of age.

Mr. W. B. Hawkins mourns the loss of his fine grey horse, which was taken from his stable last Saturday night.

Rev. Dr. Lloyd has been called as pastor of the Baptist church at this place for next year. Thanksgiving services will be held in this church on the 26th.

Some miscreant visited the Mayor's office one night last week and when departing, took with him the mayor's docket, which as yet he has neglected to return. Mayor Tippet has ordered a new docket however, and continues to do business at the old stand.

The sun continues to rise and set and D. B. Howerton continues as postmaster here, having been recently appointed for a term of four years, so there will be no necessity for an attempt to administer in this office.

It costs money to hold elections, and they should be held but once in every four years. The late election in Lavaca county cost \$1021.75, not including expense of blanks. Let our new representative, Kirk, look into this matter. XX.
