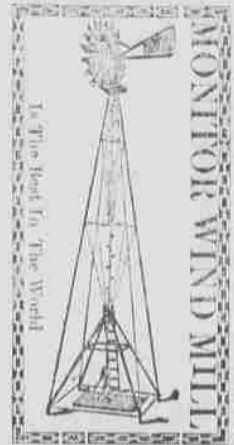

Kotzebe.

CHRISTIAN MEINHARD
KOTZEBE—Was born in the year
of 1840 in Denmark. At the age
14 he came to America and settled
at New Ulm, Austin county. After
living there four years he moved
to Benard Prairie, where both his
father and mother died; his father
dying just four days before his re-
turn home from the late war,
through which he fought on the
confederate side. He married Miss
Louise Baur at New Ulm in 1860
and after living two years longer in
Benard he moved to Lavaca county
and settled 2 miles northeast of
where Moulton now stands, where
he remained until 1880, when he
moved to Moulton and purchased
Moore's hotel. He has 13 children,
living of whom two are married
and living at Moulton. The eldest
son, Meinhard, married Miss Leona
Lighter in 1890 and Louise, the
eldest daughter, married F. J. Hel-
weg the same year. The other
children are all living at home.
Mr. Kotzebe is one of Moulton's
most substantial citizens and is
held in high esteem wherever
known.
