SHALLOW WELLS.

Every impurity from the surface seeps down into such wells and an analysis of the water would show seeds of all manner of disease, typhoid and slow fever, bowel troubles, etc. Wells should be dug deep or not at all. When we get that artesian well Shiner will have plenty of water. In the meantime don't use the water from shallow wells for drinking purposes. Bring your cotton to Shiner.

COUNTRY BOX.

BERNARD LOCKMAN—Was born the 22nd day of June, 1830.

Holstein, Germany. His early life was passed on the farm and he lived at Holstein until his eighteenth year. In the spring of 1858, his mother and father both being dead, he resolved to emigrate to America and find a new home in a new land. The first two years of his stay in America were spent in northern states and he came to Texas in 1860. Here he lived with Alex Shaeffer, who has since been to be Mr. Lockman's dearest and nearest friend and the latter in hardly find words to express his high regard for him. The war breaking out he enlisted in the 8th Texas Infantry commanded by Colonel Elwood. Mr. Lockman served from October '61 until January, '65. At the close of the war Mr. Lockman

returned to DeWitt county and lived there and in Calhoun and Galveston counties until 1876. In the latter year he removed to Fayette county and engaged in farming until 1878, when he removed to Lavaca county, living at Rocky until 1888, when he came to Moulton and entered into partnership with Edward Boehm, remaining in business with Mr. Boehm until 1891, when he went into business at his present stand and has remained there ever since. Mr. Lockman was married in 1893 to Mrs. Mary Koch of Flatonia. He is one of Moulton's most popular business men and his jolly place is known far and wide.
