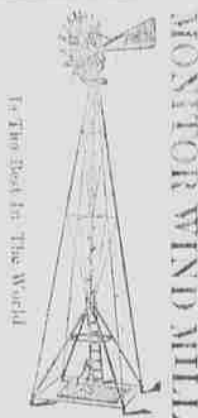

money in. West-wind.

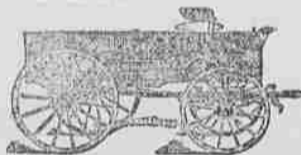
VALLEY VIEW FARM

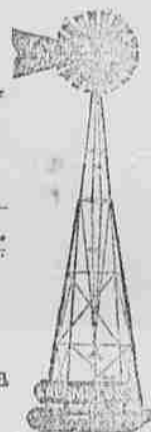
