The City in Brief.

I. A. Benton and wife, of Salt Lake, spent yesterday in this city. There was nothing doing yesterday in either the district or probate court.

The Union Pacific will expend a quarter of a million in improving in this city during the present season. The work opened with a smiling face and an appearance of activity that brought a broad grin of satisfaction to the faces of business men and real estate dealers.

A discovery of rich carbonate ore has been made in the mountains near the city. Some work on the claim will be done at once to determine the extent of the deposit. Ogden is a good place for skilled workmen to come to work. Common laborers will be demanded later in the season, when the sewers are to be built and the water system constructed.

The election, at which will be submitted the proposition to incur a bonded indebtedness of upwards of half a million dollars to be used for public improvements, will be held at 2 o'clock. A pointmaster has established himself on the vacant lot belonging to J. W. Staysen, just south of Perry's annex. There will be a fine building erected on that lot, or else a street will be run through the block from that point.

The grand lodge of Utah of the Independent Order of American Odd Fellows, commenced its annual session in this city to-day. The order in Utah is in a most flourishing condition and the present session will contain representatives from every lodge in the jurisdiction. A special car containing twenty-six locomotive engineers, came in over the Union Pacific Sunday morning and went to Salt Lake. Yesterday morning they came to Ogden and went west. Each one of the engines has been in the employ of the same company for thirty years or more.

The finest grove and the nicest place in Ogden for a summer resort are at the old Johnson place, owned by the Walker brothers of Salt Lake city. Years ago before the bridge was carried out by the laying of the electric light dam, the place was run in good shape and was well patronized.

The fire alarm boxes were being tested yesterday by the electricians who are putting in the system, which will soon be in operation. Every person should be provided with a list of places at which the boxes are placed. It should also be known to all where the keys may be procured when needed to turn in an alarm.

Sunday evening the Utah & Northern train brought down from Provo a man who had met with an accident in the railroad yard at that place. The man's right arm was cut off above the elbow, his right leg crushed, and he sustained other serious injuries. He was taken to the Union Pacific hospital for treatment.

The Liberal statesmen are busy, so it is said, preparing a ticket for the August election. There are several rings and wheels within wheels, all revolving noiselessly, showing that each has been well lubricated. Some of these slates are destined to be broken. The rank and file of the party will have something to say this year about whom they will vote for, and the schemers will surely come to grief.
