THE PUBLIC BUILDING.

Our Washington correspondent gives very little encouragement regarding the Salt Lake federal building appropriation. In fact, it is only discouraging that he sends, his best information being to the effect that the bill will not be passed at this session.

But should anybody here regret that the bill is not going through? The Senate took in the situation at once and proposed to erect a structure that would be credit to the government, an object of local pride and a building which would accommodate the business. The bill provided for an appropriation of \$500,000, and a less sum would be insufficient. The House committee, however, promptly cut the amount down one-half, thus displaying gross ignorance of the situation and exhibiting a niggardly spirit which disgusted the most earnest workers for the building.

THE BETTER WAY.

CHAUNCEY M. DEWEY talked at the meeting of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in New York last Sunday, and he said things which should have a deep influence with employers and employees generally. Chief ARTHUR, one of the best men who ever stood at the head of a labor organization, had said that during the sixteen in which he had been chief of the order, only two strikes had occurred, and both of these might have been prevented if the officers of the companies had consented to talk over the situation with the officers of the association.

Mr. Dewey said that during all the years that he had been in the head of the New York Central there had been no trouble with the brotherhood that had not been settled in five minutes. He went on to explain: "In the old time the engineer came to the old time railroad president. He referred him to the old time superintendent, who told the engineer to go prematurely to a place where he would not get an overcoat. When I entered into the presidency of the New York Central I made a change and said to the 25,000 employees of that road that the doors of my office are always open to them. 'No trouble has arisen that has not been settled in an hour.'"
