THE WOOL MARKET.

A Flourishing Wool Business in the South-Some of the Shipments.

In an interview with J. E. Clinton and E. R. Booth, the Ensign reporter learned that the Utah Wool Growers company has been doing a flourishing business in the wool trade during the present month.

"Within the last week," said Mr. Clinton, "we have handled some very large clips, which have ranged from 12,000 to 17,000 pounds each."

Following are the names of a few of the owners of the largest clips handled within the past seven days: Nephi Schofield, 71,000 pounds; Will Schofield, 30,000 pounds; Collins & Lisenby, 30,000 pounds; J. W. Seely, 15,000 pounds; J. G. Ecker, 15,000 pounds; T. G. Smith, 12,000 pounds.

"The company has been notified," says Mr. Clinton, "that the existing special freight rates will be withdrawn on the 1st inst. We are, therefore, rushing wool out as fast as possible in order to clear up all the stock we have on hand at the present time, as the rate will be a difference of half a cent between buyer and seller, which shows there is a bottom to the market."

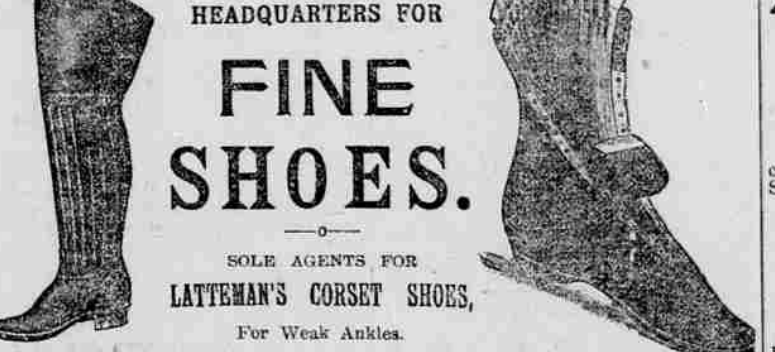
