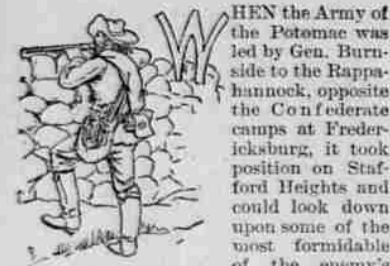


FATE AGAINST THEM.

The Heroic and Bloody but Useless Charges of French's and Hancock's Divisions-- A Tale of Woe.



When the Army of the Potomac was led by Gen. Burnside to the Rappahannock, opposite the Confederate camps at Fredericksburg, it took position on Stafford Heights and could look down upon some of the most formidable of the enemy's works.

have held their fire. Kimball's men poured their bullets and shot and shrapnel at hand. Half of the line has fallen on the way across the plain, and now the remnants plant their colors and lie down, covering themselves as best they may from the withering fire and awaiting some reinforcements.

The enemy on the hill and behind the stone wall this appeared bloody work indeed. They noted and admired the remarkable coolness of Kimball's men in planting colors and their alignments within stone's throw of the wall, where the muskets were kept hot with the rapid firing.

THE IRISH BRIGADE.

Lill's few survivors, still clinging to their colors, were the last to fall. But the Confederates have been re-sentenced to the stone wall and their ammunition expended. Such daring as French's men have shown and Hancock's will imitate has fairly alarmed the Confederate commanders, and the stone wall and sunken road are strengthened for the next charge. Zook's men have taken order into readiness, and when the Irish brigade with a cheer. From the heights above the green flag of Erin is recognized.

After them Caldwell sweeps up, gathering men from all the other commands and pressing up to within twenty and even fifty yards of the wall. At this point death and destruction are everywhere. Zook, Meagher and Caldwell were found at the time of burial.

Other charges were made by Howard's division of the Second corps, and by Sykes' and Humphreys' of the Fifth. They were brave movements in the face of the dread, hotly fought and costly battle, but the deeds of French and Hancock could not be surpassed; their heroic deed marked the limits made in the advance. No embellishment could be added to their simple record more startling than the actual figures of losses in Hancock's division, where they equaled those in any two of his others.

Hancock took into action 3,000 men and lost 2,000 in killed and wounded. The Fifty-third Pennsylvania lost 8 officers out of 14 and one-half its men. The Seventh New York lost 15 officers out of 25 and very nearly half its men. The Fifth New Hampshire lost 17 officers out of 23 and over half its men. It had five commanders during the action, the first four being killed or wounded. The Sixty-ninth New York lost 16 officers out of 19 and over half its men, and had four commanders in the action. The Eighty-fourth New York lost half its complement of officers and men. The One-hundred and Forty-fifth Pennsylvania lost nearly 50 per cent, and the One Hundred and Sixteenth, lost heavily, having four different commanders during the engagement.

The Twenty-eighth Massachusetts lost nearly half its number, and the Second Delaware suffered severely, having five of its commanders wounded. The Eighty-first Pennsylvania lost twelve officers out of sixteen and over half its men, and had three commanding officers wounded. The Fifty-seventh New York lost nine officers out of eleven, two of its commanders among them. The Sixty-sixth New York lost heavily and had three commanders killed or wounded. There was none of the excitement of a hotly contested battle to inspire these men, no dazzling prize balanced in the air to be seized by the bravest and the quickest. Before them lay the stubborn hills, the silent cannon and the sudden enemy. In marching on them they marched into the jaws of death as grandly as ever men did on earth.

KIMBALL'S CHARGE.

The enemy on Marye's Heights have been waiting hours and hours for just this. Longstreet's excellent division, under McLean, with the famous Washington Artillery, have the stronghold in their keep. Kimball's men move on with a "Hi! hi! hi!" bayonet at a charge, battering down fences with clubbed muskets as they go. Scores of our cannon from Falmouth and Stafford Heights fire upon the Confederate guns on the hill. The screaming of shells, the roar of cannon, make a terrific din, but the men have their orders and see their goal and press on without specific commands. Soon the Confederate guns change their ammunition from shot and shell to canister and spread great havoc in the ranks of the devoted brigade, but the survivors go on until they are staggered by an unexpected volley of musketry almost in their faces.
