

A PRETTY QUARREL.

The Four-cornered Struggle for Senatorial Honors.

WHAT DUBOIS' FRIENDS CLAIM.

He Made Idaho a State, Therefore the People Should Make Him Senator—Some Peculiar Proceedings.

BOISE CITY, Idaho, Dec. 7, 1896.—[Special correspondence of THE HERALD.]—The legislature convenes to-morrow at noon. Nearly all the members have arrived in the city and are fixed for their work. The session will probably be a long one and many bills very important to the welfare of the state will be introduced. It is a well known fact that the north not only wants but openly demands a Senator and though the Shoup and Dubois men have done their best in the lobbies to work it so as they could both go from the south, still they have been entirely unsuccessful. Yesterday a caucus of some of the Republican members from the north already here was held, and they voted unanimously in favor of demanding their Senator, as promised in the platform. This means many things displeasing to both Shoup and Dubois. "If both can't go, which one will go?" is the question. Neither one can secure the necessary twenty-eight votes without the other will withdraw in his favor, and it is pretty well understood that they will not withdraw. For the north the fight between Claggett and McConnell will be long and bitter and while McConnell is surely a little stronger at present, still the "Old Man" is a politician who understands thoroughly how to work, and with his experience and ability can never be counted beat until "the race is run and the members hang up."

This will make it as predicted in THE HERALD away back in September, A FOUR-CORNERED FIGHT, and no matter who wins, will make numerous sore-heads and cause several splits in the party. It is pretty generally conceded by everyone that today a popular vote was taken in the state to elect a Senator from the south, neither Shoup nor Dubois would be elected, but a "dark horse" who has not attracted the party in the eyes of those gentlemen here. Governor Shoup declared his intention of resigning if elected governor, if he could be elected Senator he do not like his action, still they cannot allow that they were warned he would do as he said, and consequently while they fully appreciate his work, still they do not consider themselves bound to elect him again, but believe in giving some one else a chance.

The result of this four-cornered fight will almost surely be a deadlock, and will probably cause the shelving of both Shoup and Dubois and the election of a conservative candidate from the south. J. R. De Lamar is the strongest man at present to fall back on.

At any rate, no matter who is successful, it will be so close as to give the Democrats THE BALANCE OF POWER and it is to be hoped they will improve their chance and secure all the good possible for their party.

The House this morning publishes the following in answer to "what is your opinion of the President's message?"

Attorney-General George H. Roberts: He is not pronounced enough in favor of free coinage. After the political revolt of November, I had hoped the President would have interpreted the handwriting on the wall to have read, "Thou hast been weighed in the balance and found wanting," on the silver question. But then it is hard for the leopard to change his spots, or the gold bug to have silver wings.

Hon. W. J. McConnell—I think we should have free coinage just as soon as Congress can pass an act for that purpose. Judge Claggett—The silver question is a very large one. It involves the consideration of both our foreign and domestic exchanges, and especially the debt-paying capacity of our people. I have always been in favor of the remonetization of silver, its free coinage upon same established ratio between it and gold, and making the coin thus freely minted at the option of the holders of gold or silver bullion, and unlimited legal tender in the payment of all public and private debts.

During the campaign your correspondent had the pleasure of hearing the two latter gentlemen speak in several different parts of the state. They both claimed that the free coinage of silver would mean the ruin of the miner, and that the only reason the Democrats demanded it, was because the Republicans had passed a bill which "was practical and absolutely the best possible act to help the silver men," and that with their usual foolishness the Democrats advocated "the free and unlimited coinage of silver," not because they believe in it, but to deceive the people and to secure Republican votes. Silver was then \$1.19. Now it is only \$1.04, and realizing, as they must,
