T. H. Merrill representative elect has spent most of the week in Salt Lake looking up legislative matters. Hazen is a candidate for the speakership and ought to get it. He would make a good presiding officer for the House.

Utah contractors are becoming famous as railroad builders all over this western country. For several years they have been doing about all the improvement and construction work on the Union and Southern Pacific, the Oregon Short Line and the Rio Grande Western. And now they are budding on the Clark road to Los Angeles and the Moffat road from Denver to Salt Lake.

Jos. H. Knowles reached home Wednesday after an absence of 29 months in England, where he has been on a mission. He spent most of his time in the Manchester Conference. He crossed the Ocean on the same vessel as Frank Thatcher and wife. They had a rather rough passage but he escaped sea sickness. On his way home he made a flying visit to Niagara Falls.

John Christensen of the 6th ward, came home Tuesday. He has been filling a mission in Norway. Most of his time was spent in the Christiana Conference. The mission is in a prosperous condition and a great many additions have been made to the church within the last two years, until the branch in Christiana now numbers over 600. Their church has become too small for them and they are now engaged in erecting a new one that will have a seating capacity of over 800. They have a young peoples tracting society, composed of young men and young women that have charge of the distribution of tracts in the city and they are doing very effective work. The choir is the largest and best in the city and attracts a good deal of attention. There are 22 elders laboring in Christiana and neighborhood and about 55 in the Conference. There are 1400 members in the Norway Conference.

J. Z. Stewart talked before the Archaeological Society, Wednesday evening on the subject of his trip into Mexico in 1875. The company left Nephi Sept. 16, 1875, and crossed the Colorado river below Kanab. As they entered the desert country the animals manifest a disposition to return home and even when hobbled they would go for miles towards home during the night. At last, one of the party hit on an ingenious device to prevent their wandering off. He took the animals, 17 in all, and tied the head of one to the tail of another. This enabled them to feed, but when they traveled it was in a circle. The party visited the Mequi Indian villages and spent several days among them. These Indians had built their pueblos on the point of a cliff or hill, where they could be easily defended. The people were expert weavers and made large quantities of Navajo blankets. They were also expert in the manufacture of pottery, many of which were artistically decorated. The party explored the region afterwards settled by the Mormon people in Northern Arizona. They passed through the Salt River and Gila Valley, passed through Tucson and visited El Paso, where they remained for some time. They then visited Chihuahua, and then explored the region in the Sierra Madre Mountains where the Mormon Settlements are now located. In returning through Arizona, they traveled at night and hid up days to escape the Apache Indians, whose signal fires they could see on every hand. They had many narrow escapes but came out O.K. and reached home safely.
