The case of diphtheria that developed last week in the Beaver Branch B. Y. U. resulted fatally. The patient was a young man 19 years of age, his home being in Kanosh.

The roof is being put on the addition to the district school house and it is expected that the new part will be ready for occupancy shortly after the holidays.

The impression seems to have gone out that we have diphtheria in Cedar. The report is entirely erroneous. The rumor probably originated from the fact that two cases of scarletina developed in a family that recently came from Beaver, and the fact that a case of diphtheria developed a short time since in the Beaver Branch of the B. Y. U. But the cases in Cedar were scarletina, pure and simple, and there has not been a case of diphtheria here for years.

The Conjoint Mutuals held a successful meeting at the tabernacle last Sunday evening, when the following program was rendered: Current Events, S. J. Foster. The speaker dealt principally with the present persecution of the Jews in Russia. Reading, Hattie Mackelprang. There being some failures on the program, Chas. R. Mayne was called to occupy the remainder of the time, and delivered a very interesting talk on Jewish history and fulfillment of Scripture.

Letters received from Elder and Mrs. Jos. T. Wilkinson, Jr., by the monthly steamer that arrived in San Francisco Nov. 14, contain the intelligence that the young people are enjoying fairly good health and are enjoying their mission on Tahiti. President Hall of the mission has recently returned from Utah with a young bride, so that the ladies have company. He also took with him a new organ, lumber and other materials for the erection of a new mission building and mission headquarters, besides a printing plant and other needed accessories. Naturally the missionaries feel that they are beginning to assume some importance and are grateful for the help extended by the South Seas Mission association at Salt Lake, which contributed largely to the fund which made the improvements possible.

We are pleased to announce that the local Mutual Improvement Dramatic Company has cast the popular drama entitled, "Twist Love and Money," which it is expected will be ready for presentation during the Christmas holidays. A move is on foot, also, for the remodeling of the upper room of the Ward Hall, the erection of a stage and the installing of a new set of scenery. Whether or not this will be accomplished in time for this play, will depend largely upon whether or not the committee having the work in charge can secure the needed lumber. The Mutuals gave us some good entertainments last winter, demonstrating that we have as good talent at home as is to be found elsewhere, if it is given a chance to develop, and the young people should have the liberal patronage of our people. Money paid to a traveling troupe goes out of the town never to return. Money spent with the home troupe remains here and circulates among us.

Two new cases of scarletina have been reported this week, one at the home of Jos. S. Fife, the other at Mr. and Mrs. Charles Corry's. Both families are under quarantine.

H. C. Maddox, field superintendent, and E. C. McGarry, district manager of the Continental Life Insurance company of Salt Lake City, are touring the southern counties of the state in the interests of their company and just now are in Cedar City.
