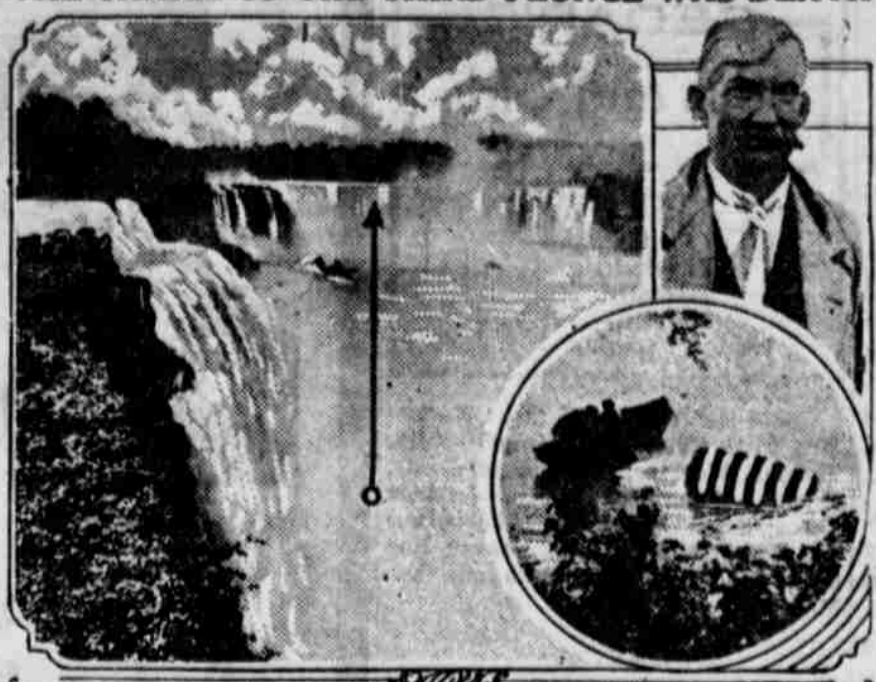

THE CHARM OF THE THIRD PLUNGE WAS DEATH



Once every ten years, for thirty years now, a human being has "shot" Niagara Falls in a barrel—and the "charm" of the third time was death. Charles G. Stephens, barber of Bristol, Eng., lost his life Sunday, July 11, 1920, when the specially-constructed oak barrel shattered on the rocks below after making the great plunge. Mrs. Anne E. Taylor, who still survives, shot the Falls successfully in 1901. Robert Leach ten years later was successful in a steel barrel. Both live at Niagara Falls. Leach told Stephens his barrel was not strong enough. The Britisher leaves a wife and 11 children—most of the children are grown.

Sedate All-Day Frocks



ONE-PIECE dresses serving the same purposes that suit-skirts and blouses do are better described by their newer name, all-day dresses. It tells their story of good service, morning or afternoon. They have been made in a few very good styles, of the same serviceable materials that are used for suits, and they have come to stay. The all-day dress and the separate skirt and blouse make a welcome variety in the apparel of active women and especially of business women. Worn under heavy coats in midwinter they are warmer than suits, and worn without a wrap when the weather is mild they are less burdensome. But leaving out these practical considerations altogether, they hold a secure place in our regard because they are dependable and offer variety in the dress of busy women. Nearly all these one-piece frocks are simple in design and many of them have been converted into frocks after doing service as suits. It is an advantage to have them simple because one does not grow tired of simple things. We may become unconscious of them, but they will not get on our nerves as fussier things do if we wear them often. As an example of simplicity the all-day dress shown above challenges comparisons. Except for a

little braid couched on in the simplest of patterns and a few bone buttons set in a row at each side, it offers nothing to take our attention away from its trim fit and businesslike air. A silk cord with tassels pretends to adjust the frock to the waist line, but that matter is taken care of in reality without its help. It makes a very fine finishing touch, however. Silk braid has been cleverly used as a decoration for these smart all-day frocks, as it has for suits. In the dress above, long lines at the sides are accented by buttons, but in a new model short tabs of silk braid were used for this purpose. Sometimes both braid and buttons appear on a frock and they seem even better suited to it and to each other than embroidery and buttons. Some models are embellished with embroidery in bands or squares, or triangles, in set designs that are in keeping with the character of the dresses, which is sedate. But they make the right kind of background for crisp collars and cuffs if one chooses to furnish them up a bit.

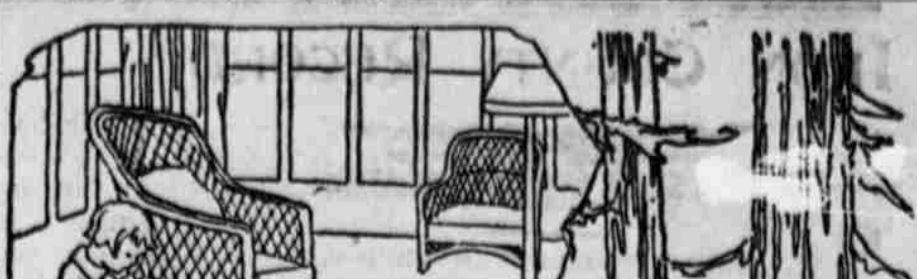
NOXIOUS WEEDS MUST BE CUT

Crop Pest Inspector, Carl Topham has set August 10, 1920 as the last date for destroying Canadian Thistle, Poison Milkweed, White Top, Cocklebur and Burdock. Instructions have been issued to the public and canal companies to comply with the State Weed law in the eradication of these weeds. Local weed inspectors have been given special instructions to inspect all land within their district to learn whether or not the order has been complied with and in case they find these weeds have not been destroyed by set date, they are instructed to proceed to eradicate them, charging costs to land owners. Notice as issued as follows:

Owners, I hereby set Aug. 10, 1920 as final date for cutting and destroying these weeds and request that all canal companies farmers or occupants of land and property owners destroy all noxious weeds on their property within Iron County.

I also call attention to the provision in the State Weed law to the effect that unless these weeds are cleaned up by the date set for the cutting, it shall be the duty of the inspector to have this work done at the expense of the property owners, same to be collected as a tax upon said property. 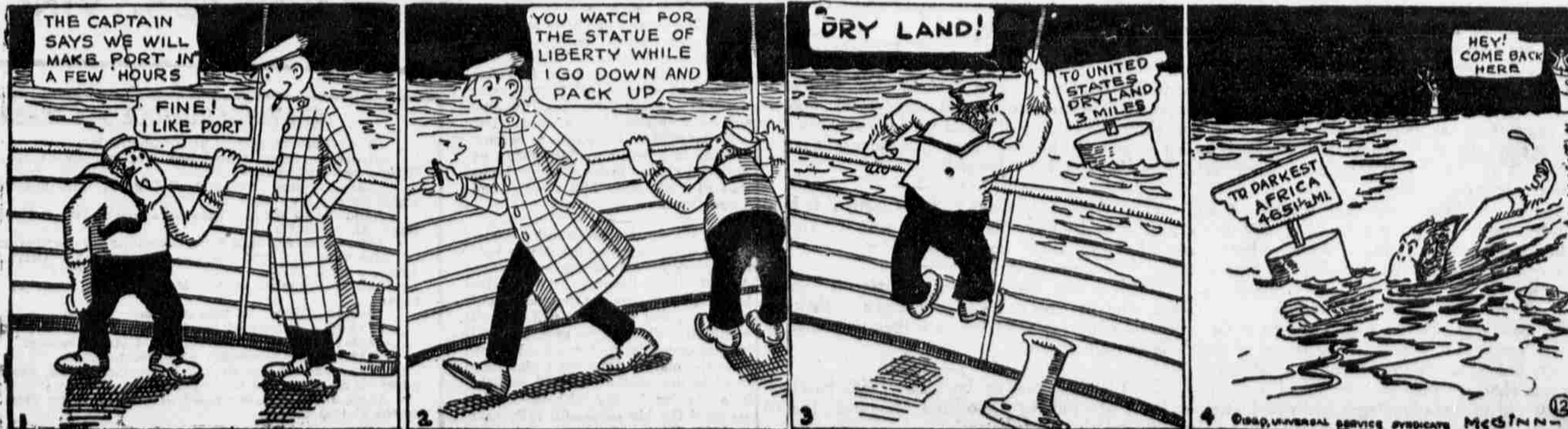
