Fort Duchesne and Salt Lake to Be Connected by Telephone. Outstanding County Warrants—County Valuations—A Talk With Banker Whitmore—State Bank Officers Elected. On the 8th day of March, 1893, this territory will be an debt, exclusive of her bond issues, a cool \$100,000 and one year for this deficit will have reached the sum of \$1,000,000.
