WASHINGTON.

London, 4.—The Standard's St. Petersburg correspondent telegraphs that the Russian government has decided to construct iron clippers, five of which will be laid down in contract with Mr. Barker, an American, in the United States, and the remaining five in England and Germany.

A Berlin dispatch to the Times says: Herr Assmann, the notorious socialist deputy, who was excluded from the socialist democratic party for expressing regret in the German Reichstag that the German socialist did not identify themselves with the British, has lately embarked for America, in a way which inclines some journals to describe his departure as a precipitate flight for refuge. He was an unprincipled deprecator and a sham friend of the working-men.

London, 5.—The Times says Abdullah Khan is undoubtedly pleased. His most serious rival, Ayoub Khan has been weakened by the accident and the vengeance of the British. He sees now Ayoub Khan has not the slightest chance of being allowed to cut him from the throne.

The minority vote of 51 on the compensation bill, in the House of Lords, included 21 official and 34 official liberals, and the majority vote included 63 liberals. This government was defeated by a majority of 12 in its second attempt.

Paris, 5.—The Figaro, commenting on the result of the elections for council general, says, two courses are open to the conservative, either to accept the isolation and exclusion from public life, or renounce their daily diminishing hopes and accept a respectable and form a conservative party which cannot be changed with hostility to the republic.

Washington, 4.—Southwick Guthrie, until now bookkeeper in the office of the auditor of railroad accounts of the interior department, has resigned his position, to take charge of the Northern and Southern and Central Pacific, and other subsidized land grant railroads. This resignation will be made with a view to preparing reports showing the condition of these roads, which Auditor French is required by law to furnish to the secretary of the interior on the 1st of November of each year.

Political.

Cincinnati, 4.—The democrat of the Third Ohio District, yesterday, nominated General J. Durbin Ward for congress. The republican convention of Hamilton County this afternoon re-nominated Hon. Benj. Butterworth in the first district, and Hon. Thos. L. Young in the second district, for Congress.

New York, 5.—The Post's special says that F. A. Poole has formally consented to accept the republican nomination for governor of New Jersey. It is not probable there will be any opposition to him in the convention.

Saratoga Races.

Saratoga, 4.—The track was muddy and heavy. In the three-quarter mile dash "Hercules" first, "Dora" the favorite, was second. Time, 1:20. In the mile and a quarter "Col. Sprague" was first and "John" second. Time, 2:41. In the second race, "Lute Blackburn" was first, and "Fenwick" second. Time, 2:41. In the third race, "Walter" first, "Rose" second. Time, 3:14.

Another Decision.

Washington, 5.—Commissioner Williamson of the general land office, today, rendered a decision in the Kowah Limestone Ledge Mine case. The commissioner holds that lands valuable for limestone do not necessarily fall within the classification of land as minerals. He directs that the application of the applicant Jacobo to enter the tract as mineral land be refused, and awards the land in question to the Southern Pacific Railroad Company.

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REPUBLICAN CONFERENCE.

New York, 5.—The corridors of the Fifth Avenue Hotel were crowded this morning with republicans from all parts of the country, who are here to attend the conference. From 8 o'clock this morning Gen. Garfield was besieged with visitors. He expressed himself as feeling well and recovered from the fatigue of yesterday's journey.

The republican conference was called to order by ex-Governor Jewell, chairman of the national committee, who made an address and approved the object of the conference. It was followed by several other speakers.

The Central Republican Club gave a reception last evening in the parlors of the O'Connell House to John C. Fremont. Among those who were introduced to Fremont were General Keyhole, first auditor of the treasury department, Collector Merritt, B. F. Macomber, George Edgar, A. J. Ditt-hoffer, Horace Hooper, ex-Governor Richard McCall, and many of the members of the club. Fremont, though feeble in health, spoke enthusiastically for Garfield.

Sherman Declines.

Washington, 5.—Sherman positively declines to favor the publication of a copy of the letter written by him in December, 1870, to which the letter of General Hancock was a reply.

Victorio Gilding Away.

San Antonio, 5.—Victorio is moving north on the Texas side. The Mexicans are entirely out of supplies, and are marching down the south side of the Rio Grande.

Fire.

Madrid, 4.—A fire at Jauretta, Province of Navarre, destroyed eighty out of 100 houses, which the village contained. Several persons were injured.

Census of St. Louis.

St. Louis, 5.—Special agent Sawyer, who has been visiting the census returns of this city, says the population will be 240,000.
