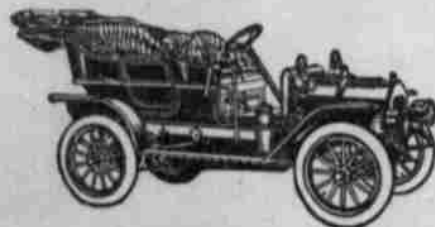

ARID FARMING

DRY FARMING IN SANPETE.

The Deseret Farmer is in receipt of some samples of very fine wheat, forwarded to us by Mr. Erastus Peterson, a former student of the writer's. Mr. Peterson is in charge of some irrigation investigations for the Utah Experiment Station, and while engaged in this work has had occasion to observe the results of some work in dry farming in Sanpete county.

Mr. Daniel Whitbeck has a farm located in a pretty little cove about seventeen miles northwest of Gunnison, in a place known as Flat Canyon. Mr. Peterson visited this farm in company with Mr. Whitbeck and was very much surprised to find as beautiful a field of grain as he has ever seen, and surprising to say it is the first crop on new land. Last year Mr. Whitbeck's neighbor, Mr. L. F. Becker, raised 38 bushels per acre on new land, while another neighbor, Mr. Sylvester Pierce, raised 43 bushels per acre, this however, being on land that had been under cultivation for some time.

Mr. Whitbeck has been studying arid farming for the past four years, and Mr. Peterson concludes from the results, that Mr. Whitbeck has a good understanding of the methods employed. The land he has in preparation for fall seeding, is in splendid condition. He is using the latest cultural methods, and is following as closely as possible the directions mapped out by our scientific agriculturists and bulletins. Mr. Whitbeck has spent eight years of his life in Mexico, two years in Canada, and has traveled clear across the continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and from Canada to Mexico. To our representative, Mr. Whitbeck said, "I have seen in my travels some very beautiful and productive country, yet in all my experience I have never seen a place better suited for a typical farm life than is to be found in Utah."

Mr. Peterson also sent us some samples of wheat from Mr. L. F. Becker's farm, these heads measuring over six inches in length, and giving evidence of wonderful growth, thus the work done by the Experiment Station in behalf of arid farm-

ing is bearing fruit. It is only a matter of a short time until there will be a general understanding of the methods employed in conserving the moisture, and when that time comes there will be no Utah deserts.

PLANT TURKEY RED WHEAT.

The College Pure Food company is in receipt of the following letter from the Inter-Mountain Milling company. As it contains a business proposition which it may be well for all wheat growers of the valley to look into, we offer it for their consideration referring them for further information to the company at Salt Lake City.

Salt Lake City, Utah, June 25, '08.
College Pure Food Company:

Gentlemen.—We expect to ship a car of Turkey Red wheat from Kansas which we will sell or exchange with farmers at actual cost. We are particularly anxious to get this grade of wheat started in Utah and Idaho for a number of reasons.

In the first place there are large quantities of Kansas flour shipped to markets that Utah mills should supply, simply because of the quality of the wheat that the Kansas flour is manufactured from. This Turkey Red wheat can be grown successfully in this country as a number of farmers have and are growing it and are very much pleased both with the quality and the yield. Besides this it is highly recommended by the Agricultural College.

Perhaps the strongest argument in favor of this wheat is that mills in Kansas and other eastern states that grind the Turkey Red wheat are able to ship their flour into all western markets where the local flour is made from white or soft wheat and they always command much higher prices.

Three things are essential for good crops:

First. Ground well prepared.

Second. Good, clean seed.

Third. Rotation of crops.

These three things, if practiced, unremittingly will assure good results.

This car of seed we are shipping from Kansas will be of the very best quality and we cannot urge too strongly the importance of farmers in this section growing this kind of wheat. This will enable us to shut
