THE MANTI FARMERS' CLUB.

To the Editor Deseret Farmer:

While at Manti last Friday, Aug. 28th, I called on the secretary of The Farmers' Club of Manti and had a very interesting conversation. I learned from him that this association had been the means of benefiting the farmers in many ways. They are doing better farming than ever before, and are using more scientific methods than were formerly used.

Through the efforts of this club a system of rotation is being tried, a thing which hitherto has been unknown there. Peas have been introduced as one of the crops to be grown in this system of rotation. Up until this year farmers have only grown crops on half of their land, while the other half lay fallow. By the present method of rotation they expect to use all their land every year.

Previous to this year Manti has not produced enough potatoes to supply the local demand. Now the secretary is looking for a good market where he can dispose of several carloads for the farmers. They are all raising one variety (the rural New Yorker) for the market.

This organization has been able to get twine, for the binders, at almost cost this year, thus making a great saving for the farmers. Through the organization the seed potatoes and peas which were introduced were obtained at greatly reduced rates.

The secretary advises me, that though they have done a great deal to benefit the farmers this year they are just beginning, and with the experience of the past will be able to do a great deal more in the future.

It is indeed a pleasure to visit farmers when one can get them interested.

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This is what it contains:

Dried Fruit

- 2 pounds fancy figs.
- 4 " prunes (large size).
- 4 " peaches—fine quality.
- 4 " apricots " "
- 4 " loose Muscatel raisins.
- 2 " seedless Sultana raisins
- 3 " fancy " " seeded.
- 2 " fancy pears.

Canned Fruit

- Put up in heavy cane syrup.
- 3 cans apricots, fancy quality.
- 3 cans peaches, fancy quality.
- 2 cans pears, fancy quality.
- 2 cans plums, fancy quality.
- 2 cans grapes, fancy quality.

Nuts and Honey

- 5 lbs. walnuts, large, No 1, soft shells.
- 3 lbs. almonds, large, No. 1, soft shells
- One-half gallon Orange-Sage extracted honey.

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
