

# CAINE TALKS OF VERNAL COUNTRY

## One of the Very Best Watered Sections of the Entire West That Soon Must Come Into Greater Prominence.

That lack of transportation facilities alone has kept the Utah county region from becoming one of the richest and most prosperous sections in the entire West, is the opinion of J. E. Caine, secretary of the Salt Lake City Commercial club. Just what the building of the proposed Denver and Salt Lake through mine of rich agricultural and coal lands in Colorado and Utah will do for this state the commercial club publicity bureau and the Utah Development league will endeavor to approximately ascertain. Numerous inquiries are coming in since the news that the Moffat tunnel amendment was voted by the people of Denver in a special election Tuesday of last week, which opens the way for the boring of a tunnel under James Peak. The commercial club has always felt keen interest in the Moffat road extension and has supported every feasible plan to bring about its realization. Secretary Caine of the commercial club is perhaps as well informed on the benefits that will result to the state from this road as any other man in Utah. In an interview he says:

"The building of the Moffat road through Utah county will bring into direct communication with Salt Lake City an undeveloped empire offering attractive homes to thousands of settlers and investment to millions of capital. The Utah Basin is the best watered part of the state and the topography is ideal for the construction of irrigating systems. In the few short years since the reservation was thrown open to settlement canals already constructed are supplying more than two hundred and fifty thousand acres of ground. It is estimated that at least another hundred and fifty thousand acres will be watered by projected canals at a minimum cost to the land owner. The addition of this four hundred thousand acres to the producing area of the state will add much to our riches and the transportation facilities supplied by the new road promise quick returns to the sturdy pioneers who have opened up this new frontier."

"The Ashley Valley at the extreme end of Utah county is not a part of the Indian reservation and has not been settled for more than thirty years. This beautiful spot is capable of producing fruits, grains, alfalfa and honey in great quantities and with its delightful climate is one of the most attractive valleys in the state. The town of Vernal, with its asphalt pavements and electric lights, its charming homes and hospitable people will prove attractive to many of the thousands who will follow the new road across our border from the east."

"The lands of the entire region crossed by the Moffat road are most fertile and with transportation facilities this new region ought soon to rank among the richest sections of the entire West."

### INSPECTION OF STOCK

Official Quarantine Placed Upon All Shipments of Diseased Cattle.

Sweeping quarantine against the importation into Utah of all horses, cattle and swine except such as have been subjected to strict inspection and examination for contagious and infectious diseases, was put into effect last week by an official proclamation issued from the office of Gov. William Spry. The proclamation applies to all the states in the union, the Dominion of Canada and all foreign countries. It is to be effective from the date

of issue, May 21, to December 31, 1914.

In declaring the quarantine Governor Spry explained that it has been reported to him from reliable authorities that the live stock industry of the state are endangered by the importation of infected animals. The proclamation sets out the nature of the diseases to be guarded against and enumerates the tests and inspections that must be made for horses, mules, asses, cattle and swine before they can be admitted within the state. Health certificates guaranteeing the animals to be free from disease must accompany every shipment into the state.

Particular provision is made in the proclamation to guard against tuberculosis in cattle and cholera in swine. Treatment and tests for each of these diseases are specified. The action of the governor in declaring the quarantine is in line with similar steps by governors of other Western States recently. It is inspired by the common report that disease is unusually prevalent among horses and cattle throughout the West at present.

### WAR ON TYPHOID

Special Efforts Made By the State Board of Health On Fever.

Special efforts are being made by the state board of health to prevent the spread of typhoid fever in Utah, and all health inspectors have been furnished printed forms on which to report all cases within their jurisdictions. As a result of the special efforts made during the last three years, the prevalence in the state of typhoid fever and diarrhoeal diseases in infants has been greatly reduced.

During the year 1910 there were fourteen hundred and four cases of typhoid fever in Utah, which resulted in a hundred and forty-three deaths. In 1911 there were only six hundred and seventy-six cases and seventy-one deaths, and last year the number was reduced to five hundred and forty-nine cases and fifty-five deaths.

The average number of deaths among infants under 2 years of age from diarrhoeal diseases for the five-year period ending 1910 was a hundred and seventy-one. During the year 1911 the number of deaths was reduced to a hundred and twenty-one, and last year to a hundred and thirteen.

It is possible to continue the reduction of these diseases until they are practically eradicated, and to this end the co-operation of health officers is earnestly desired.

It also has been arranged to have an inspector of the state board of health visit localities desiring assistance on request, and the Widal test will be furnished free of charge.

### HEREFORD CATTLE TO COMPETE FOR PRIZES

The American Hereford Cattle Breeders' association has offered special premiums for animals exhibited at the coming state fair, one of the requirements regarding the eligibility to compete being that they must be recorded in the American Hereford record.

Exhibitors must file with the secretary of the fair association the name and herd book number of each animal entered for these premiums and the fair society in reporting the awards to the secretary of the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' association must give the name and number of each.

Otherwise premiums will not be paid. Competition for the prizes is open to the world. Awards of seven, five, three and two dollars will be made in each class.

State Engineer's Office, Salt Lake City, Utah, May 23, 1913.—Notice is hereby given that Nephi O. The commingled water will then be conveyed by means of two ditches aggregating 9200 feet in length where it will be used from April 1st to September 30th, inclusive, of each year, to irrigate 1280 acres of land embraced in Secs. 10, 15 and 22, Twp. 14 South, Range 12 East, Salt Lake base and meridian. In addition to the quantity of water above specified, the applicant intends to appropriate five hundred (500) acre-feet of water which will be diverted at the points above described and conveyed to three reservoirs embraced in Secs. 10 and 15, Twp. 14 South, Range 12 East, Salt Lake base and meridian, where it will be stored during the period from January 1st to December 31st, inclusive, of each year. The center of the impounding dams are described as follows: East Reservoir, 3637 feet north of the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of Sec. 10; West Reservoir, 3483 feet north and 650 feet west of the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of Sec. 10; and South Reservoir, 263 feet south and 396 feet west of the south quarter corner of Sec. 10; all in Twp. 14 South, Range 12 East, Salt Lake base and meridian. The water so stored will be released from April 1st to September 30th, inclusive, of each year, and used in connection with the seven and one-half cubic feet of water per second to irrigate the tract of land herein described.
