

NO ROOM HERE FOR "NEVER WORKERS"

Sheriff Thomas F. Kelter Keeping Close Tab On Any Agitators That May Wander Over From Tucker.

General Manager Wattie of the Utah Construction company was down from Ogden last Saturday and Sunday in conference at Price with A. Bowman, superintendent of the company's work between Mohrland and Castle Gate. While here he went over the line of the Utah railway company, and after returning expressed himself as well pleased with the progress so far being made. The company is at this time working something like fifteen hundred men, two steam shovels and hundreds of teams.

Neither General Manager Wattie nor Superintendent Bowman give much consideration to the strike going on the past two weeks over at Tucker on the Denver and Rio Grande work. The strike there has about worn itself out as is shown by the large number of men coming in every day from Colorado and various points in Utah and Nevada. The company treats with its employees individually, but has positively refused to recognize the Industrial Workers in any shape or form.

Threats have been made by the Industrial Worker leaders that they will force the men to quit this side of Kolder Summit, but not much stress is placed in the threat. Guards have been put on by the company. These are named with the consent of Sheriff Kelter, and agitators will be shown out of the country at the first intimation of any act of violence. Carbon county has no use for the bunch and they will not be tolerated for a minute.

Several of the strike leaders have been given jail sentences the past week before a justice of the peace at Provo, some as many as seventy-five days.

TUCKER SITUATION IS IMPROVING RIGHT ALONG

SALT LAKE CITY, June 23.—That the labor situation at Tucker is improving daily is the opinion expressed by a Salt Lake City citizen who came in on last night's Denver and Rio Grande train. "One train into Tucker from Denver," said he, "brought between forty and fifty men and about thirty came in from Salt Lake City. These new arrivals are being put to work as fast as they can reach the place. The situation here is being made more and more difficult for the Industrial Workers of the World pickets and these are leaving Tucker about as fast as the strikebreakers are going in."

"While I was at Tucker a couple of unpleasant incidents occurred which indicated that the disturbing

spirits are not altogether quelled, but the situation is greatly improved over what it has been. When the men from Denver were getting off the train a number of Industrial Workers began to warn them away from the place because there was a strike on. One of the pickets became so noisy that he was struck by one of the deputies and hustled out of the crowd.

"Another incident was when a workman was brought in with his eyes injured by the premature explosion of a blast. One of the Industrial Workers pickets, upon hearing the cause of the accident, said that it served the injured man right and that the blast should have killed him. The crowd could not stand for that and the picket was obliged to seek protection from the deputies to save himself from personal violence.

"Word is being passed around among the Industrial Workers pickets that when they were obliged to leave for Salt Lake City they should get off the train just before reaching this city, because the rockpile awaits them if taken in by the police. The situation is gradually clearing itself and the contractors hope to be working full forces within a brief time."

The Utah Construction company and others filed suit last Saturday at Provo against the Utah Railway company for the collection of a balance of thirty-five hundred dollars due on contract work of last October. This contract, entered into last October for tunnel work over in Spanish Fork Canyon, amounted to nine thousand dollars, of which sum fifty-five hundred dollars has been paid.

PRICE ITALIAN BUMPED FOR BIG WAD OF MONEY

Swindled out of twenty-four hundred dollars—the savings of ten years of hard labor—in Ogden, by a clever confidence man, whom he thought to be his friend and benefactor, Pirnata Duffand, an Italian who claims Price as his home, has asked the aid of the Salt Lake City police force to help him in finding the swindler, whom he believes to be at Zion. Duffand went to Ogden about three weeks ago from Price, where he had been working for the past ten years, and had twenty-four hundred dollars credited to him in a savings account in a Price bank.

Shortly after he arrived in Ogden he became acquainted with the man who later swindled him out of his savings. He never learned his name, but the stranger treated him with so much respect and showed him such a good time that Duffand trusted him as a bosom friend.

It is said that the confidence man took the Italian to Salt Lake City and later went with him on automobile rides and told him he was wealthy and lived at Hotel Utah. He also told Duffand how he had profited by certain speculations and confidentially told him of the twenty-four hundred dollars savings in the Price bank. The stranger divulged a plan whereby he could double his money and offered to leave Duffand twenty-four hundred dollars as security.

The confidence man told him to have it placed in a safe. Duffand had the envelope locked up. After waiting ten days and the friend failed to make an appearance, he said that he became suspicious and opened the envelope. To his chagrin and amazement, instead of finding twenty-four hundred dollars security in the package as he supposed, there was nothing but paper.

Duffand went immediately from Ogden to Salt Lake City and notified the police. He said that the stranger who had swindled him had come from Sparks, Nev., and that he stayed at Hotel Utah. Other than that Duffand could give no information. The records at Hotel Utah show that no man from Sparks, Nev., had registered during the past month. Duffand said that the confidence man was an Italian, but he did not know his name.

Later Detectives Zeebo and Lelchler arrested a man at the Denver and Rio Grande depot at Salt Lake City who gave his name as John Heberta, 39 years of age. The detectives say that his right name is Johnson and they implicate him with the swindling of Duffand. Johnson is said to be an accomplice of the man who swindled the Italian from Price of his savings.
