SUPPLY VERY LIGHT PRICES ARE HIGHER

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 19.—Cattle supply this week has been lightest of the year, total run barely reaching 15,000 head. Improved pasture conditions in native territory, reviving pastures, and making the corn crop safe for a few weeks, cut down the run of native cattle. The same influence will probably keep down the supply next week and there will probably be a good market. Killing grades are generally 25 cents higher this week, and stockers and breeders are 40 to 75 cents higher. No strictly prime natives were here, some good to choice steers selling at \$8.00 to \$9, including some of the first shipment from Missouri blue grass pastures, wintered steers, corral on the grass. Medium and plain natives ranged down to \$7.50, cows largely at \$5.50 to \$7, a few at \$7.50, heifers \$7 to \$9, bulls \$5.75 to \$7.00, veals \$5 to \$10. Very few West-erns have been received this week, a few medium sugar mill steers Monday at \$8.25. Quarantine supply has also been deficient, only half as large as a year ago, as Oklahoma has hardly gotten started yet. Some good North Texas fed steers sold at \$7.55 to \$8.10, though they were not choice, some middle class South Texas steers at \$6.50 to \$7.05, and some low grade Oklahoma grassers around \$6.25. The first Oregon wintered steers of the season sold in the native division this week at \$6.80 to \$7.35. Demand for stock cattle is far greater than the supply, and prices have almost recovered recent losses. Most of the stockers sell this week at \$7 to \$7.50, whereas last week most sales were at \$7 and downwards.

Spring lambs are higher this week, best at \$9.25 last two days, and wethers are strong, natives being worth up to \$6.25, and light Texas wethers at \$6.15. Best native ewes sell around \$5, Texas ewes up to \$5.50 this week, common ewes and wethers \$4.25 to \$5, goats \$3 to \$3.90. Receipts are very light, and there is no chance for any liberal supply here for almost two months ahead.

"The Southern Capital."

Benjamin F. Wheeler Dead.
Benjamin F. Wheeler, founder of the town of Aspen, Colo., and a wealthy mine owner of that state, died in Los Angeles last Friday. An attack of pneumonia poisoning two years ago caused complications from which he never fully recovered. He was 65 years old.

Work Temporarily Stopped.
On account of the lack of Jordan sand to mix with the cement, Inspector Wilson stopped work on the sidewalks Saturday. A new supply of outside sand was received the first of the week and work allowed to resume.

Colorado U. S. Attorney.
Harry B. Tedrow of Boulder, Colo., has been named by President Wilson as attorney general for the state of Colorado.
