## WOOLGROWERS' MEET IN SALT LAKE CITY

NATIONAL CONVENTION OPENS THIS MORNING.

Monster Exhibit of Wool Industry Showing Evolution of Wool From the Live Sheep to Woven Fabric—Election Next Saturday.

Woolgrowers from all parts of the United States where the industry is a factor, will be in Salt Lake this week for the annual convention of the National Woolgrowers' Association, November 12th, 13th and 14th. During the two days prior to the national convention the woolgrowers of Utah have been in session.

This is the first time the national convention has been held so early in the season. Secretary R. W. McClure states that indications point to a large attendance. In fact, the convention dates were changed from midwinter to November with a view to stimulating attendance. In midwinter many of the growers found it inconvenient, because of bad weather, to get away from their ranches.

The convention sessions will be held in the Auditorium, Richards street, which will also house a great exhibit of the wool industry. This exhibit has been shown in several cities, and after being seen here will be set up at the stock show in Chicago. The evolution of wool from the live sheep to the woven cloth fabric will be actually shown at the exhibit. One afternoon of the convention will be given over to an examination of the exhibit by the delegates and to a lecture upon it.

Governor Wm. Spry, Mayor Samuel E. Park and President W. F. Jensen will welcome the growers in behalf of the state, the city and the commercial club, respectively. J. M. Wilson of Douglas, Wyo., will make the response for the convention. Following will come the annual addresses of President F. J. Hagenbarth of Salt Lake, Eastern Vice President A. J. Knollin of Chicago, and Western Vice President M. J. Foster of Flagstaff, Ariz. The secretary, R. W. McClure, also will report at this session. The only other address scheduled for the opening day will be given by Hugh Sprout of Boise, president of the Idaho Woolgrowers' Association. He will talk on "Predatory Wild Animals and Their Eradication."

Tonight the delegates and their wives and daughters will be honor guests at a reception and ball at the commercial club.

Friday morning, November 13th, will be given over to the following addresses: "Sheep Rearing in National Forgets," by Associate Forester Kipp of Washington, D. C.; "Sheep Feeding on the Range," by Hugh H. Wood of Spencer, Ida.; "Cross Breeding of Sheep," by Senator C. H. Williams of Deer Lodge, Mont.

In the afternoon the evolution of wool will be explained in a lecture at the wool exhibit. An athletic exhibition will engage the delegates on Friday night, while their feminine entourage enjoys the theater as the guests of the commercial club.

#### Election On Saturday.

The annual election of officers and selection of a place for the 1915 convention will take place the last day, Saturday. The report of the committee on resolutions will be heard, in addition to which there will be the following talks: "The Future of the Public Domain," by Senator E. O. Selway of Dillon, Mont.; "The Best Type of Range Ewe," by J. R. Allen of Draper, Utah; "Banking and Woolgrowing," by J. E. Cozzit of Salt Lake; and "How to Get Better Prices For Lamb," by J. E. Paul of Chicago, editor of the Live Stock World.

#### TWO NEWSPAPERS FINED ON A LOTTERY CHARGE

Two Utah newspapers paid fines of a hundred dollars each in federal court Saturday, pleading guilty to the charge of conducting lotteries. The newspapers were the Ogden Examiner and the Box Elder News, published at Brigham City. The fines were imposed by Judge John A. Marshall.

The two newspapers published advertisements of merchants in their respective towns offering tickets with purchases, drawings of these tickets for valuable prizes, ranging from autos and grand pianos to vacuum cleaners, to take place later. Both publications were indicted by the federal grand jury.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The retail price of beef advanced today to one and two cents a pound above the opening price of the week. Lamb and mutton also advanced two cents a pound. Mutton was quoted at 15 cents wholesale. The increases, except in the price of beef, were attributed to shortage in the local supply, most of which is obtained from Chicago.

### RISKY STEP IS FATAL

Emery Leinbaugh Had Served D. & R. G. Thirteen Years.

Emery Leinbaugh, 41 years of age, trainmaster for the Denver and Rio Grande on this division, was killed near Soldiers Summit Thursday of last week when he fell from the pilot of the locomotive of No. 6 passenger train east bound. He received a fractured skull and died before witnesses of the accident could reach him.

Leinbaugh was riding on the pilot of the engine when train No. 5 passenger, west bound, approached. He flagged the engineer of the approaching train to slow down and when the engine reached him he attempted to step from the pilot of No. 4 to the pilot of No. 5, but missed his footing and fell. His head struck the pilot of No. 5 and his body was torn to one side. The crews of both locomotives witnessed the accident and immediately rushed to his assistance, but when they reached him he was dead. The body was taken to Detour and taken to Salt Lake on a later train.

Mr. Leinbaugh had been employed by the Denver and Rio Grande for thirteen years, part of which time he spent in Grand Junction. He has been trainmaster in Salt Lake for several years. He is survived by his widow in Salt Lake and by two sisters and his parents, who live in Chicago.

### CANNOT SHIP LIVE CATTLE INTO THE STATE OF UTAH

State Live Stock Inspector Issues a Suspension Order As a Precaution.

Shipments of cattle into Utah have been suspended on order of Dr. A. C. Young, state live stock inspector. This action was taken by the inspector Sunday as a precautionary measure to prevent the chance of an epidemic of the foot and mouth disease among Utah cattle. The disease does not exist in this state.

Cattle in various states to the east have been ravaged by the foot and mouth disease during the last few weeks, but quarantine on stock shipments into Utah applies to cattle from any point whatsoever outside the boundaries of the state. Such a menace has the disease become in those states where the cattle are infected that inspector Young deemed it best to take no chances on cattle from any section.

The inspector notified the railroads of the quarantine, which becomes effective immediately. Similar action was taken by Dr. Murray, the live stock inspector of Montana, and by the Idaho inspector, according to advice received by Dr. Young.

The quarantine on cattle shipments does not, of course, affect meat shipments, so that inspector Young's order is not likely to have an immediate effect upon local prices of steaks and chops. It is regarded likely, however, that with a curtailment of cattle shipments to the killing markets, Chicago, Sioux City, Omaha, Kansas City and St. Joseph, because of the foot and mouth disease scare, meat prices everywhere may advance.
