STATE LEGISLATURE RADICALLY CHANGED

MANY FAMILIAR FACES ARE MISSING.

Several Veterans Return After Long Absence—Folk Leads Minority—Nine Members Retire and Former Republican Returns as Bull Moose.

In both houses of the legislature there will be several familiar faces missing. Though the republicans will be in control of both branches of the state legislature, there will be a new president of the senate and a new speaker of the house. President Henry Gardner, who has been at the head of the senate for the past three sessions, was defeated for re-election in Utah county. Speaker W. J. Seely of Emery county was not a candidate for re-election to the house and his place was taken by a democrat.

In the senate Benner X. Smith and W. N. Williams, veteran legislators of Salt Lake county, will be missed. Former Senator John H. Seely of Sanpete made a hard fight to return to the senate, but was unexpectedly beaten by Orlando Bradley, democrat.

Senator J. W. Funk of Cache county will be the veteran member of the upper house of the state legislature. He served through two sessions of the senate and was re-elected by a heavy plurality. Senator Funk is a democrat and will be the leader of the democratic-progressive minority in the upper house. Had the democrats and progressives secured control of the senate, Senator Funk would undoubtedly have been chosen president of the senate.

Nine members of the senate retire on the first of the year and Senator Funk was the only one of the nine who was re-elected. Only Senator Gardner and Senator Funk sought re-election. Of the new members of the senate, two, J. H. Wootton and H. T. Reynolds, are graduates from the house. Both are from Utah county, the former a republican and the latter a democrat. Mr. Wootton was a member of the 1909 and 1911 legislatures and Mr. Reynolds a member of the 1913 legislature.

In the house two prominent democratic leaders are missing. They are Milton H. Welling of Box Elder and Samuel L. Page of Piute, both veteran legislators. Mr. Welling was defeated for re-election and Mr. Page is now registrar of the United States land office at Vernal.

W. C. Horsley of Box Elder, who defeated Mr. Welling, received the usual order of things. He was formerly a member of the senate and now comes to the house. He still is prominent in republican councils of the lower house.

C. R. Mabey of Davis county, who is likely to be the speaker of the lower house in 1915, was prominent in the last legislature, being the leader in the movement for the committee on committees, which wrested much power from the speaker in the naming of committees.

NEXT UTAH LEGISLATURE HAS REPUBLICAN MAJORITY

Utah's next legislature will be republican, with the ratio of twenty-three republicans to nineteen democratic-progressive and one socialist. Following is the personnel of the senate and house as shown by the returns:

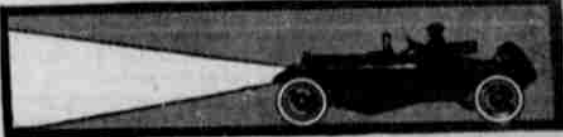
