ADVANCE IN COPPER PRICES CAUSES SOME APPREHENSION

Reports indicate that copper selling agencies are apprehensive over the rapid advance in metal. They do not want to see the price advanced so rapidly that producers will again begin increasing their output and cause an overproduction. They are willing that better prices be paid for the ore now being produced as some of the mines can not make a profit on the metal below 13 or 14 cents a pound. But the porphyry mines have been able to show a profit ranging from 7 to 8 cents and a lower cost is made on a larger production.

Selling agencies have worked hard to hold the price of copper level. They believe that the market is in a fair way to recover and some have expressed the belief that a 15-cent market will be witnessed within a few months if the situation is properly handled. It is apparent that more copper will be shipped to the foreign countries if this country takes a decided stand against the seizure of metal consigned to neutral countries. The demand for war munitions is just beginning to be felt, and copper enters largely into these supplies.

This country is expected to show a much larger consumption of the metal than it did just previous to the European war. Our manufacturers are called upon to supply more of the finished product than ever before, and a larger portion of the manufacturing industries in foreign countries will be destroyed before the war is ended. Some of these factories have been closed since August and we are being called upon to supply a great many things that the European countries were able to produce.

The Engineering and Mining Journal says: Our own opinion, based on information received from the principal refiners is that the present stock of refined copper is low than is commonly supposed, whatever may be the accumulation of blister copper. Ever since August last there have been regular deliveries of copper on old contracts, while the deliveries for export have been surprisingly large until lately; and in the latter part of October there developed a rather large volume of new business, which was checked but momentarily by the British seizure. Consumption has in fact been increasing in this country, especially in the brass business. On the other hand the refiners did not wait to work up all the blister copper in transit to them on August 1st, but in several important instances inaugurated curtailment right away.

WOULD ELECT BOARD BY A POPULAR VOTE

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 28.—Crea-
tion of a state board of education, to
be elected by popular vote, with
power to appoint a commissioner of
education and a corps of assistants,
was recommended by the Utah Edu-
cational association yesterday, the
last day of the most successful con-
vention in the history of the society.

The plan would do away with the
office of state superintendent of pub-
lic instruction, an elected officer. The
commissioner of education would re-
place him. The recommendation was
made in the adoption of the report of
the laws committee. Some of the
delegates objected to the report, but
when the motion to adopt was put it
carried easily. The changes proposed
are in line with the desire of the
teachers to place direct supervision of
the school system under partisan
political influence.

Besides urging a state board of edu-
cation and a commissioner of edu-
cation the report of the law committee
recommended a complete revision of
the state laws relating to schools. Upon
adoption of the reports these recom-
mendations became the recommen-
dations of the association. They may
be summarized as follows:

That school funds be available as
soon as possible after taxes are col-
lected; that county school districts of
the first class elect one school board
member annually for a term of five
years; that the state course of study
be outlined before the adoption of
text books; that county superintend-
ents be sufficiently paid to insure de-
votion of all their time to the work;
that county commissioners have the
power to consolidate school districts
regardless of population; that a law
be enacted providing for election of a
representative state board of educa-
tion to act as a board of control, with
power to appoint a commissioner of
education, a state grammar grade
supervisor, both of whom shall be
experts in education; a state school
architect and such other profession-
ally qualified persons as shall be nec-
essary to supervise the schools.

Official Organ Wins.

The move to discontinue the Utah
Educational Review as the official
organ was characterized by a tilt be-
tween A. M. Merrill of Box Elder
county and President G. N. Child. Mr.
Merrill charged that the chair was
favoring those who would retain the
official organ. Mr. Child resented
the insinuation and declared the chair
was merely endeavoring to be fair.
Mr. Merrill apologized.

Friends of the Educational Review
fought valiantly to retain it as the of-
ficial organ, since abolition of it as
such would kill the publication. How-
ard R. Driggs, the newly elected presi-
dent, was one of those who disap-
pointed the Review. At the end of
discussion on the proposal to do away
with the official organ W. J. Creer of
Utah county moved to lay the motion
on the table. This carried and the
official organ was retained.

The petition to amend Article 11 of
the constitution, arbitrarily fixing the
three days preceding Thanksgiving as
the dates for the convention and giv-
ing the convention or the board of
trustees power to set the dates, came
up just before the noon adjournment,
when many delegates had left the hall.
Those present voted against making
the change, but when the proposal
came before the convention again in
the afternoon, on motion to reconsid-
er, it was carried by a substantial
vote. It is understood that the trust-
tees will communicate with every
board of education and every teacher
in the state to ascertain what con-
vention dates will satisfy a majority.

SALT LAKE FIRM BIDS ON
SADDLES FOR EUROPE

The Salt Lake Hardware company,
through representatives of foreign
countries in the United States, has
been requested to bid on harness and
saddlery destined for use by nations
now at war in Europe. The order, if
secured, will aggregate in the neigh-
borhood of \$1,000,000 and will neces-
sitate a double force at its factory and
two shifts of workmen. Even though
the entire order is not landed, the
company hopes to receive a portion
of it.

The largest bid asked for comes
from Osaka & Co. of New York, a
Japanese contracting firm. It calls
for 15,000 sets of heavy artillery har-
ness for two-wheel and two-head
teams and an equal number of sets of
transportation harness for two-wheel
and two-head teams. It is specified
that the harness must comply with
standards adopted by the United
States government for its artillery.
These standards are very exacting and
demand the best of workmanship and
the most durable leather. Although
the nation wanting the harness is not
specified, it is assumed that Japan is
the one to whom it is assumed the or-
der will go to that country.

The Japanese firm's bid company, act-
ing for Osaka, asks for bids on 2,500
sets of harness and 2,500 pieces of
saddlery. The saddle
are to be of the type used by the United
States army and must comply with
the government standard. Un-
der the army saddles are known as the
"McClellan" type and are made in
government plants.
