URGES OVERHAULING OF THE UTAH WATER LAWS

Recommendation Is Made to the Governor By State Engineer.

That a thorough legislative overhauling of Utah's water laws is indispensable in the interests of proper adjudication of water rights in the state, is the opinion of State Engineer W. D. Beers, as set forth in his biennial report, filed Monday with Governor Spry. Proper adjudication and conservation of the water resources of the state would, in the opinion of Mr. Beers, result in a \$200,000,000 increase in the land value of the state.

To the end that effective water legislation may be accomplished, Mr. Beers recommends that during the present session of the legislature a commission be appointed to investigate the question, preparatory to the making of a report to the legislature at the 1917 session. The recommendation includes the suggestion that a special appropriation for the expenses of the commission be made.

Mr. Beers would have the work of investigation completed within the first year of the life of the commission and the findings set forth in the form of needed legislation.
