**SENATOR COLTON'S RECORD**

Five Out of Six Bills Introduced Become Laws.

Another measure introduced by Senator Colton and which became a law was a bill giving the county commissioners power to appropriate money for the maintenance of cemeteries and allowing the county to take care of them. This bill was introduced especially for the benefit of Utah counties.

A fourth measure, which later became a law, was the introduction of a bill providing for honesty in the labelling and selling of coal. In Carbon and Emery counties, part of Senator Colton's district, some dealers have been in the habit of substituting inferior grades for the home mined coal and in some cases selling Wyoming coal when the local coal was ordered. This bill provides a penalty for substituting other coal than the one ordered.

Senator Colton was the father of a bill providing that no county shall pay more than \$500 in bounty in one year for the English sparrows. Evidence showed that some of the extreme western counties were being compelled to pay bounties on sparrows brought in from Nevada. This bill became a law.

The last bill introduced by him and which became a law granted the state land board power to grant rights of way through state lands for railroads.

Out of six bills introduced by the senate of the legislature by Senator Don D. Colton from this district five became laws. The sixth one, a bill providing that the county assessors and treasurers be elected for a term of four years, one to be elected every two years, this senate providing for a term of at least two years experience when the newly elected officer takes his position, passed the senate but was killed in the house. The state tax commission was behind this bill.

Perhaps the most important piece of legislation which Senator Colton introduced was the general road bill calling for an appropriation of \$100,000 to be expended on the roads of the state. Senator Colton was chairman of the committee in which this bill was drawn up. The bill divides the counties of the state into different classes and allows each county \$2000 provided they appropriate a sum according to their class to be expended with it. Utah county must appropriate \$1500 in order to secure the first named amount.

A new feature of this bill is the fact that the money may be expended on any road in the county which in the opinion of the county commissioners and the road commission will benefit the greatest number of people. Therefore the money had to be spent on the state highways. The bill became a law.

**MILLIONS FOR GARNOTITE**

Secretary Lane Prefers Domestic Development of Carnotite Deposits.

Assurances that \$100,000,000 will be spent on the carnotite, potash and phosphate lands of Utah were made by Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior department, at Ogden while on his way to San Francisco. Various Eastern capitalists, he declared, had made him promises to spend that much money on the lands of this state just as soon as certain bills are passed in congress which will allow the taking up of power sites under certain conditions and also the right of the government to lease deposits of minerals.

Although Mr. Lane had but a few minutes in which to express his opinion of Utah and the development of its resources, he said that he was particularly interested in the development of its exceptional wealth in minerals found in abundance here and not in other states. The carnotite fields of this state, he said, seem to be much greater than in any other state. The phosphate deposits of Idaho, Wyoming and Utah seem to center in the state, which holds more of this class of land than either of the others. The potash problem in Utah, he declared, was still something new in the state but said that the most abundant fields in southern Utah gave promise of developing a big industry for the state.

"I regret very much that the last congressional session failed to pass the water power and leasing bill as it would have meant the immediate expenditure of \$100,000,000 in Utah," declared Secretary Lane.

"Capital does not feel quite safe in making the investment I have been assured of until the bills which were pending in the last congress are passed and enacted into law. The men wish to utilize the water power for hydroelectric energy. One bill provided for this, while the other allowed the granting of leases on certain lands that have been withdrawn by the government. The bills were introduced in the house of representatives at my suggestion. They were reported out favorably by committee and were sent to the senate where they died on the calendar, the shipping bill overshadowing them so far at the last minute they could not be passed.

"I feel confident that at the next session of congress the matter will again be brought up. Just as soon as it is done Eastern capitalists will begin expending their money. People in the East are looking with a great deal of interest towards Utah and its great mineral wealth. I have been assured \$100,000,000 will be spent on the carnotite fields, the potash deposits and upon the phosphate properties just as soon as the capitalists feel a little safer in making investments. One eminent Eastern capitalist has assured me that he alone will spend \$20,000,000.

"These assurances come from men who have made a thorough examination of the situation, have personally looked over the fields and received the opinion of their experts. They know exactly what conditions are here. They are not men who make any display of what they intend to do.

"The bills that I caused to be introduced were at their request, and they were approved by them as meeting the situation. They are willing to expend their money just as soon as congress passes the bills so they can do so."
