## STEADY PRICES ON CATTLE FOR THE WEEK

TOP LAMBS BEING \$10.25 ON THE MARKET.

Stocks and Feeders Are Firm At the Highest Figures Yet Paid—Texas Fed Yearlings Bring \$11.75—Hogs Are Ten to Fifteen Cents Higher Though Receipts Exceed Demand.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 14.—Cattle receipts of thirteen thousand head sold at steady prices on an average, though there were weak spots, but there was evidence of need of cattle on all sides. Top steers \$12.00. Hog receipts were one thousand head and market ten to fifteen cents higher. Top \$12.45. Sheep today seven thousand head, seventy higher and top lambs \$10.25—higher of previous. The market for best cattle would have been stronger today, but action of the government in restricting grain export trading had a weakening effect. However, buyers need cattle and buyers were all out in good season. Receipts included some year prime steers at \$12.50. Feat choice steers available at \$12.25 to \$12.50, and some good quantities steers from Texas at \$11.45. Those prices show an advance of twenty-five to fifty cents over sales of same cattle a week ago. Plain native cattle without much feed are \$10.50 to \$10.75. Live were good today, some cattle showing signs of coming weight. A train of California steers sold at \$11.25 four loads of light steers and at \$10.60. Dutch cattle are firm today, best cows up to \$10.75, bulls \$10.25. Colorado pulp bulls \$9.75, guarantee bulls \$9.99. Veal calves sold up to \$12.25. Country buyers are confident with respect to future, and stocks and feeders are firm at the highest prices yet paid. Stock steers \$8.25 to \$10.50, feeders around \$10.00 and a few feeder steers up to \$11.00 or better. Stock cows and heifers are much wanted and bring \$7.25 upwards, choice heifers around \$11.00. Hog receipts overran estimates today but buyers were keen competitors, sales ten to fifteen cents higher. Some stockmen developed, but the top \$16.45 was paid near the close, three or four loads at that figure. Medium weight hogs bring up to \$10.25 today, and lights \$10.25. Apparently the buying side has no difficulty in moving the product at a profit and stands ready to take everything that comes at strong prices. Shipments from distant western points continue to be a feature. Two loads of California pigs today, among other shipments from intermediate range states. Pigs bring \$12.50 to \$14.75.

## WILL BEAR OWN BURDEN

Coal Mine Operators to Pay On Insurance Plan.

Utah coal mine operators will be required to pay into the state insurance fund at the rate of \$6.62 for each hundred dollars of their payroll. Estimates and calculations just completed by the insurance fund officials are permitted to stand after conference with the operators. Definite announcement of the coal mines rate under the insurance fund law will not be made for at least three weeks, as the state industrial commission will give the coal operators ample time to work out a mutualization plan that is being tentatively considered by the operators. If the plan is adopted by the operators, that industry will bear the entire burden of its own casualty compensation. The operators will be required to cover into the insurance fund a fund of one hundred thousand

dollars to guarantee the payment of all liabilities that will fall upon the insurance fund. This amounting to the amount of their contribution in case of a catastrophe. Whether the operators will adopt the mutualization plan will depend upon the results of the calculations of their actuaries. If they find that the proposed mutualization plan will carry a smaller possible expense to them than through their accepted the state insurance fund plan, it is altogether likely that it will be adopted. The proposed rate of \$6.62, which is now thought by the commission will be the rate governing the coal operators, is \$2.12 higher than the rate charged against the coal mining industry in Colorado. The rate of \$6.62 in Utah is based on the hypothesis that the Colorado rate is \$8.58 per hundred dollars of payroll. If the Colorado rate is seven dollars, which point has not been definitely fixed by the Utah commission, the Utah rate will be nine dollars per hundred dollars of payroll. While the information has not yet been made available to the Utah commission on the Colorado rate, an actuarial bureau has been asked for the pure premium rate on coal mining, but the reply to this does not make the rate of apply the coal rates. The commission will have definite information, however, in time to work out the Utah rate in advance of the decision of the coal operators to adopt or reject the system of mutualization. Utah operators, it is understood, were prepared for an announcement of a rate of about nine to eleven dollars. If the proposed rate of \$6.62 is adopted, they will fare better than they had expected.

## C. N. STREVELL DISCUSSES PRESENT COAL SITUATION

C. N. Strevell of Salt Lake City, president of the Independent Coal and Coke company with mines at Kenilworth, in commenting on the coal situation for 1917, says: "The coal situation for 1917 presents many angles which were never before apparent. The mines for the last ten months have had a large excess of orders over what they were able to produce. The railroads have been unable to furnish sufficient equipment to keep the mines running over 65 per cent of the time. A great many of the miners have become dissatisfied with enforced idleness on account of car shortage and have abandoned the coal fields for the metal mines and factories, where they could have continuous employment at almost any wage they asked.

"The demand for coal has largely increased as the railroad companies are using every locomotive it is possible for them to secure. Factories have multiplied, particularly sugar factories—five new factories having been built during 1916 and four under construction for 1917. Each of these will require in the neighborhood of ten thousand tons of coal annually. There has been practically no coal received on the Pacific Coast from Australia, New Zealand, China or Japan for over a year. The amount of coal from British Columbia has been greatly reduced by an act of the British government and the high price of coal on the Atlantic seaboard has prevented any coal moving through the canal to the Pacific Coast.

"The high price of oil has made it necessary for a great many oil users to return to the use of coal as it is possible to secure it. It is estimated by good authorities in California that the consumption of oil at the present time is forty thousand barrels per day more than is produced, the result being that the amount of storage oil is being rapidly reduced. The only substitute for oil is coal. Just where they are to secure this is the problem. Present developments in the coal fields of Utah would very likely be ample to supply the requirements if sufficient miners were obtainable and the transportation facilities adequate for handling the same. Higher prices for coal are sure to prevail.

"On account of the shortage of miners in the coal fields, operators are looking for a mechanical substitute for this class of labor. So far, however, there has been nothing offered by the manufacturers that is satisfactory, so that there seems no immediate relief in this direction."

## DISEASE AMONG SHEEP

The state live stock board has been informed of an outbreak of disease among the preferred Hampshires sheep owned by the Keeso farm at Ephraim, and will make an investigation on the ground this week. This will be the initial step taken by Dr. H. W. Hoagman, state live stock inspector, in a trip which will take him over Sanpete, Beaver, Millard, Juab and Utah counties. One of the matters to be arranged by Dr. Hoagman on the trip will be the lining up of dairy cattle preliminary to the tests for tuberculosis.
